Plain, Fancy Rolls

Here is a standard roll recipe which can be made to yield an endless number of shapes and forms.

Standard Roll Recipe

- 1 cake yeast
- 1/4 cup lukewarm water
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 2 cups scalded milk
- 8 cups sifted flour

Soften the yeast in the lukewarm water. Add the butter and sugar to the hot milk. Cool to lukewarm, add a beaten egg (if desired), and combine with the yeast and water. Stir in the sifted flour and salt until the dough is stiff enough to knead. Knead thoroughly, form into a ball, and put into a buttered bowl to rise. Cover the bowl and set it in a pan of warm water to keep it at a temperature of 80 to 85 degrees. When the dough has doubled in bulk, punch the center, pull the sides over and press them into the center. Then turn the ball so the smooth side is up and let the dough rise to the same volume as before. Knead again. Shape as desired, and put in a warm place to double in bulk. Then bake in a hot oven (400 degrees) for 15 to 20 minutes.

POLICE REPORT
