

1940 Election to Cost \$173,000

Oregon's two 1940 elections, the primary on May 17 and the general on November 5, will cost in the neighborhood of \$173,000, records of the state department at Salem disclosed.

The state's share of the election cost is divided into \$22,000 for the primary election, \$27,000 for the general election, \$12,000 for general administrative expenses and \$2000 for compiling and printing the election laws.

The candidate's pamphlets, to be printed and distributed before the primary and general elections, will cost approximately \$11,500. Election supplies sent to counties will add another \$2000. Included in these supplies will be 12,000 three-inch darning needles, 175 gross of short pencils, many forms and blanks and copies of the election laws of the state.

As an offset against the \$63,000 election costs to the state approximately \$18,000 will be received in fees for space in the candidates' pamphlets. This will leave a net cost of \$44,200 to the state for the two elections.

The major share of the election costs to counties is the expense of the election boards for the 1695 voting precincts. There will be approximately 2750 of these boards, each consisting of five members. Members of the election boards receive \$3 a day.

Oregon's longest ballot will be handed out to voters in November, provided all preliminary petitions for referendum and initiative measures now on file with the state department are completed.

A total of 16 measures and amendments have been listed with the secretary of state.

Of this number four constitutional amendments were referred to the voters by the 1939 legislature, six measures come up by referendum and six by initiative petitions.
