LANE FLAX PRODUCTION

Thirty-five and possibly more Lane county farmers have signed up to grow flax another year. The thirty-five growers will plant approximately 1,300 acres, to produce from one to two and a half tons per acre. The government will give a subsidy of \$6.50 per ton this year. Flax production was started in the county in 1936 and has been gradually increased since then. The fiber will be processed partly in the state and partly in the east, the local county flax is sent to Portland, where it is processed for the oil.

Most of the planting has already been done this year and the crop will be gathered in July.

Reorganization of Mt. States Co. Is Completed

Z. E. Merrill, president of the Mountain States Power company, today stated that the company's reorganization and its debt refunding plan have been completed and that new certificates of preferred and common stock are now being exchanged for old certificates in accordance with the provisions of said plan of reorganization.

A meeting of the new board of directors of Mountain States Power company has been called for April 6 at Albany, Oregon, at which time it is expected that a dividend of \$3.75 per share, accrued since September 30, 1938, will be declared upon the new preferred stock. After such preferred dividends are declared, the directors will then consider the advisability of declaring from the remaining surplus a dividend to holders of the new common stock. The directors may decide to hold such surplus intact or may decide to disburse at least a portion of it as a dividend on the new common stock, as may seem advisable from a conservative and sound business standpoint and having in mind the company's 1940 rate reductions program.

No dividends will be paid except upon the new certificates and consequently it is a distinct disadvantage to the stockholder to delay making this exchange.
