

B. Land Missing At Dorena; Found After Long Search

Quite a commotion was caused in the Dorena community Tuesday when B. Land, farmer living across Row river from Dorena, was missed for about 24 hours. Mr. Land, 72, who makes his home with his brother, N. Land, had gone in a pasture with the brother to cut wood Tuesday morning. When the brother was called to the house and returned, he found Mr. Land missing. He found the axe used by his brother, but was puzzled as to his whereabouts after a brief search. Finally a searching party was organized and the party consisting of about thirty men, hunted until about 11:30 Tuesday night and located the missing man about 10:00 o'clock yesterday morning, after a 24-hour search. Mr. Land was trying to drive home a cow with a young calf and his friends said he probably did not realize that his absence would cause any anxiety.

Late Irrigation Models To Be Demonstrated Saturday Near Coburg

Latest models and designs in irrigation equipment will be demonstrated at Chula Vista Dairy about one mile south of Coburg and about one mile north of Coburg bridge on the Eugene-Coburg road the afternoon of Saturday, March 30, starting at 1:30 p. m. Equipment suitable for irrigation of truck crops, orchards, pastures, and other crops both by different types of sprinklers and by flooding will be demonstrated. Those attending the demonstration will have an opportunity to see excellent stands of ladino clover and alfalfa on Chula Vista Dairy farm that were irrigated last year.

The demonstration has been arranged by the soils project committee of the Lane County Agricultural Council cooperating with O. S. Fletcher, county agent. Arthur S. King, extension soils specialist of Oregon State College, will be present to take part in discussions and to help farmers on individual problems. All interested persons are invited to attend.

Salmon and Celery Souffle

2 tablespoons butter
3 tablespoons flour
1 cup milk
2 cups flaked salmon (one 1-lb. can)
1 cup finely chopped celery
½ tsp salt
3 eggs

Melt butter over low heat, stir in flour, add milk, stirring constantly, and cook until thickened. Add the salmon and celery and mix thoroughly. Separate eggs and add egg yolks, one at a time, beating thoroughly after each addition. Beat egg whites until stiff and fold carefully into first mixture. Pour into buttered casserole, place in pan of hot water and bake in moderate oven (375 deg.) for 45-50 minutes. This makes 4 servings.

Cheese Souffle

Omit the salmon and celery. Add one and one-third cups grated American cheese to the hot mixture and stir until melted. Add a dash of cayenne pepper.
