LIME AVAILABLE TO FARMER

Under the federal agricultural conservation program, lime is now available to the farmers of the county, it is announced at the office of the Lane County Agricultural Conservation association yesterday. This is a grant of aid, the same as superphosphates.

Any group of farmers ordering 30 tons or more of the lime may obtain it at \$6 a ton in bags and the amount is deducted from the allowance under the conservation program. In addition to this, the buyer pays the freight charge from Salem to the unloading point plus a handling charge. The maximum overall charge is \$7.10 a ton in this county.
