Peeler Log Bill Up for Hearing

Bills to place an embargo on the export of Douglas fir peeler logs and Port Orford cedar logs will be heard today before the state department subcommittee of the house committee on ways and means at Washington.

Congressman James W. Mott (R. Ore.), who introduced the measure in the house, has insisted on hearings at this time notwithstanding the adverse report of the secretary of state, who contends that enactment of the bill would hamper the state department in negotiating foreign trade agreements. Ordinarily the ways and means committee does not hold hearings on bills having adverse departmental reports. An exception was made in this case, however, and the Congressman is hopeful of favorable committee action.

Douglas fir peeler logs are used chiefly in the manufacture of plywood, which is sold all over the world. But although Oregon and Washington produce 90 per cent of the peeler logs practically no Douglas fir plywood is exported from these states because foreign manufacturers invariably purchase their plywood material in log form in the United States and manufacture it in their own countries. The proposed embargo aims to build up the export trade in finished plywood and to conserve the supply of peeler logs, which is rapidly diminishing.

The embargo on export of Port Orford cedar logs is urged on the ground of conservation and national defense. Port Orford cedar is the only wood from which satisfactory battery separators can be made, and the world's entire remaining stand of this timber is in Coos and Curry Counties in Oregon. The forest service estimates that the supply will last only about ten years unless conservation measures are enacted. In the meantime the Japanese for years have been buying Port Orford cedar logs and storing them in Japan to be used for the manufacture of battery separators there when the American supply is exhausted.

Cars Furnish One Out of Seven Jobs

Throughout the United States, the motor transportation industry provides a powerful stimulant to the output of goods and services, being responsible for one-seventh of the nation's pay envelopes, according to Ralph A. Coan, treasurer of the Oregon State Motor association.

"Cities and towns which cannot boast the production of a single car or truck are automobile centers in their own right, deriving their chief source of livelihood from parts and supplies furnished to motor plants," the club official said.

"The sales and servicing of motor vehicles found in numerous other communities, the construction and maintenance of highways, the commercial operation of cars and trucks, and the supplying of motor fuels combine to make more than 6,000,000 jobs.

"On the farm, too, the financial stake in the motor industry is important. Agricultural products from nearly 2,500,000 acres went into the manufacture of motor vehicles in 1939.

"The south, traditionally the home of many essential raw materials and scene of many growing industries, furnishes typical examples. Basic is the fact that automobiles produced last year required ten per cent of the cotton sold in the United States, the equivalent of the average crop of 100,000 cotton farming families."

RECORD TURKEY POULT PRODUCTION ANNOUNCED

TANGENT, Ore.—A hatch of 250,000 turkey poult—a new record for Oregon—for the 1940 season was announced Monday by Carl Newport, veteran Willamette valley poultryman and operator of the Pacific hatchery at Tangent.

Last year the hatchery produced 135,000 turkeys. This year's quarter million birds are all contracted for and will be consigned to poultrymen in California and the northwest.

"Prospects look better now for the poultry industry than at the start of the season," Newport said. "Prices will be about the same as last year, however."

New Mental Aid

The federal director of mental hygiene has announced that 46 per cent of the patients in Australian government mental homes who have been treated with the new insulin-cardiac shock treatment have recovered full mental health. The treatment was carried out on 202 patients of whom 92 were restored mentally.
