Lemley Reports On Two Meetings C. of C. Luncheon

E. R. Lemley, manager of the Chamber of Commerce, made a report on two interesting activities at the Tuesday luncheon program of the organization. The report of Mr. Lemley was the principal talk made during the program. He told of the possibilities of getting assistance from the forest service and the CCC administration in establishing a ski run in the Bohemia section at the Champion mine, but the public must evidence interest in the project if assistance is to be obtained. Work of clearing a run as well as road repairing might be set up as a project and carried out by the CCC enrollees. There is plenty of timber in the old Champion mill house suitable for building a shelter near the ski run.

The latter part of Mr. Lemley's report had to do with the trip made by Mr. Lemley and Carl Rynearson, manager of the Pacific highway association to the Oregon commercial secretaries convention at Ocean Lake recently. One of the impressive things brought out at the convention was the fact that the Oregon coastal scenery has not been commercialized as in other sections of the country and tourists in the western part of the state may enjoy the scenery and comforts without the customary small fee usually charged, Mr. Lemley stated.

NELSON REAPPOINTED

Word was received here Monday of the reappointment of N. J. Nelson Jr. as local postmaster. Nelson, a resident of this section for the past thirty years, was appointed acting postmaster July 1, 1933, and commissioned as postmaster in July of 1935.

Since 1933 the postal receipts of the Cottage Grove post office have practically doubled and the office moved to its present location the first door west of the First National Bank about a year and a half ago.

George A. McCullough of Reedsport was the only other Oregon postmaster renominated Monday.

The consistent gain of postal receipts the past seven years, shows the need for a federal post-office building here which may be obtained with a little effort on the part of the citizens and the congressmen from this district. Receipts for 1939 were \$18,896.35 against \$10,736.85 for 1933. And 1939 receipts were about ten percent higher than in the preceding year. This year will show approximately the same increase according to the present trend.

Last year Cottage Grove was rated third from the top in prospects of securing a new post office building and larger quarters, but since that time smaller communities have through effort secured federal appropriations.

In commenting on the prospects for securing a building for which several sites have been optioned by the post office department, Mr. Nelson said the local post office had done all it could toward securing the needed building and that it was up to the citizenship to make an effort to get a federal appropriation or let the office remain in its present quarters, which are inadequate in view of the expansion of lumbering and of the prospects of securing the dams.

Correspondence with reference to securing a new building is on file and chances have been very good that Cottage Grove might receive early and favorable action, but little or nothing has been done in the past two years.
