When condemning other countries for their attempts to lengthen their boundaries, we are likely to forget there was a time when the U.S.A. faced much the same problem. It must have received similar condemnation. We might well ask ourselves in view of the fact that once there was no U.S.A. how did it grow to its present size? Surely some one's toes must have been stepped on in the process. Although much of the territory was bought or honestly bargained for some was gained by force. Of all the territory we now possess only one strip has come directly under American rule without having first been owned by a foreign power.

The British Empire suffered the loss of the 13 original colonies. Such loss was undoubtedly justified from our viewpoint but it's very doubtful that the British felt the same about it.

Spain and then France ruled in the territory of the Louisiana purchase. This extended from the Mississippi west over a larger area than the United States of that day included. Napoleon's dream of French colonies in America died when he accepted a much needed \$15,000,000 for the immense Louisiana territory.

Florida, a strip of land more than five times the size of Connecticut, was bought from Spain for \$5,000,000. Our gain of Texas and California was Mexico's loss. Spain had ruled there as well as in the Philippines and Porto Rico which we now possess.

Alaska was purchased from Russia. No one at the time realized the wonderful possibilities of this snow-covered, ice-bound land. Every year it yields greater returns in minerals, forests, fish and furs.

Hawaii was ruled by its native kings before the American came. Other bits of territory too numerous to mention in limited space had their various rulers. But one piece of land may be said to have come under "Old Glory" when it first emerged from the wilderness. It is a part of the last won portion of the American domain, Spain, Russia, and Great Britain, as well as the United States did lay claim to it and for twenty years it was occupied jointly with Great Britain. But the "Oregon Country" has officially recognized no sovereign other than the United States of America.

ENLISTS IN ARMY RESERVE

Portland, Oregon, Roland A. Tucker, son of Mrs. Jennie Redford of Cottage Grove, was honorably discharged from the United States Army at Fort McDowell, California on April 12 while serving as a member of the corps of engineers and enlisted in the regular army reserve on the same date, it was announced yesterday by Lieutenant Colonel H. Tucker, who recently returned from a tour of foreign service in the Hawaiian Islands, was accepted in the corps of engineers reserve, and in the same grade he held upon discharge from the regular army, Colonel Bagnall said.

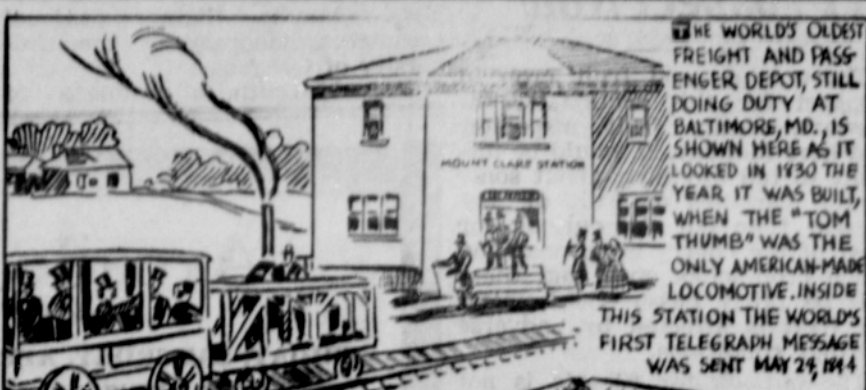
Origin of Peter's Pence

Mercury 8 Ranks With Best Sellers

Mercury 8, the sensational Ford-built car that ranked among the nation's ten best sellers in 1939, its first year on the automotive market, gives every indication of setting an even greater sales record this year. Wilbur Wilson of Woodson Motors, local Ford dealer, declared this week.

The local dealers revealed that in the Pacific northwest territory alone, sales of 1940 Mercury 8 models during the first three months of this year were 88 per cent above those for the same 90-day period of 1939.

Apparently feeling the stimulus of an intensive "Let's Go" sales program and the opening of the spring travel season, sales were particularly strong the final ten days of March, statistics showed. Mercury 8 business increased 94 per cent the last ten-day period of the month, compared to March 20-30, 1939.

Especially popular this spring, according to the local dealers, are the club convertible sedan models, two all-weather body types. The latter is an entirely new Mercury model, produced this year for the first time.

Both have fully automatic tops, powered by a vacuum from the intake manifold which completely eliminates the laborious task of raising or lowering the top. A control knob, conveniently located on the instrument panel at the left of the driver, sets the mechanism in motion.

The 1940 Mercury not only looks long—it is long. All models measure 196 inches from front to rear bumper, 127 inches from front to rear springs, and 116 inches from front to rear axle. Inside the car, space conserved by the compact V-type engine has been skillfully translated by expert designers into extra inches of usable space for passengers.
