News Briefs

Many patients expected to die of a mysterious and supposedly incurable brain disease have been saved by a new vitamin treatment at Bellevue hospital in New York, it was learned recently.

The treatment consists in administration to the brain disease patient of nicotinic acid, one of the newly isolated and synthesized vitamins.

It has been developed and tested on a series of persons by Dr. Karl M. Bowman, director of the division of psychiatry at the Bellevue hospital and his colleagues Drs. Norman Joffe, Louis A. Rosenblum, Harry D. Fein.

The supreme court ruling holding anti-picketing laws of Alabama and Shasta county, California, unconstitutional was greeted with enthusiasm Monday at Portland by organized labor in Oregon where the state's picket regulation law is before the Oregon courts.

Although not identical to the Oregon statute, both of the laws held unconstitutional contain some of the questions which are being disputed in the courts on the Oregon measure.

The county court Monday received from the Lane county agricultural council, through a committee, a resolution indorsing the action of the league of Oregon counties, favoring legislation providing for a contribution from the federal government to the counties of the state in lieu of taxes on the large acreage of federally owned land in the different counties.

The resolution was adopted by the agricultural council at a recent meeting and was presented by a committee consisting of Allen P. Wheeler, Fred E. Chambers and O. E. Crowe.
