But that isn't enough. Generalities and criticism are two small-bore weapons, but specific proposal and constructive suggestion is absolutely necessary this year.

Senator Vandenberg has had to take forthright positions. He is on record on everything. But he is recorded on so many sides of so many questions that Mr. Roosevelt's ghost manded speech factory would go to work on him with whoops of glee. Senator Taft just isn't sufficiently articulate. His principal asset is a name and, while it was the name of a very great man, it wasn't the name of a very great President, and the senator seems to be a chip off the old block.

There are two candidates available to the Republicans who would take care of themselves with Mr. Roosevelt on their feet in any ring in the country—and with no holds barred.

One is Mayor La Guardia of New York, who has a mind like a steel trap, can speak masterfully on any public question at a moment's notice and has hung up the best comparative record in the country—bar none—not only as a vote-getter but as an able, honest, conservative and effective chief executive in the second hardest job of the kind in the nation. He did it with no political party at all behind him. He has a distinct national standing with agriculture and with labor on his congressional record.

The other is Wendell Willkie. You can't dismiss him because he runs a public utility any more than you can dismiss La Guardia because he is called "radical." I try to visualize these men as candidates or Presidents, rather than by thoughtless label.

With either or, better, both of these men on a Republican ticket, we shall see a real race. The way matters seem to be trending now, it will be just 1936 over again.

RAILROAD PROBLEMS
Our log jam of unemployment should be scientifically attacked at the key timbers. For seven years we have been doctoring the symptoms by handouts "to distribute purchasing power." Every single one of these rules and subsidies, by increased taxes, debts and regulatory burdens, tends to increase the cost of things as fast or faster than it spreads the purchasing power to consume them. The latter effect cancels out the former.

Recently more intelligence has been applied to releasing one of the key logs in the jam—building construction. Another equally important key log is the railroad mess. There has been so much decay and so many improvements in the railroad industry that if they could get that capital, the modernization of our railroad system would afford a very large re-employment. It could speed up our whole economic system—save time and lower costs of everything that moves in commerce.

This is the surest and soundest way to increased consumption, hence production, hence employment—and to farm relief.

Senator Wheeler's bill for railroad reorganization is among our most important pieces of legislation. It recognizes that some railroad capital structures must be "put through the wringer" by prompt and realistic court action reducing obligations to pay for dead horses of past mistakes or on values of property beyond what can be properly classified as their reasonable power to earn.

Newman Explains Columbia Campaign

Ethan Newman, representative of the Eugene Toastmaster's club, was the guest speaker at the weekly luncheon program of the Chamber of Commerce and spoke on the annual Columbia Empire Industries campaign which begins April 26th, and its meaning to this section of the country. The Columbia Empire, a truly undeveloped empire, embraces the greater part of Oregon, Washington, part of Idaho and Montana and has the greatest potential possibilities of any section in the United States, Mr. Newman told members of the Chamber of Commerce. The purpose of the campaign is to further home industry and to aid in the distribution and consumption of home products.

Inasmuch as this section of the country is a producer of raw materials, the balance of our trade relations with other parts of the country is about fifty to one. In other words the Columbia empire imports about fifty times as much material in the way of manufactured articles as it exports and on account of the cost of transportation goods manufactured in our own area should be more economical to buy, the same quality considered.

Another benefit of the campaign is that it will create employment in this section of the country. Closing his address Mr. Newman urged members of the Chamber to capitalize on the tourist attractions of the section and suggested that the Chamber of Commerce or some other organization sponsor a school of information to which service station attendants and others contacting tourists would be invited to attend.

Lorane 4-H Clubbers Build and Equip 400 Acre Stock Ranch

Four years ago, S. L. Godard, principal of the Lorane High school in attempting to vitalize his teaching program, organized a 4-H Builders club.

The first project was the construction of a group of dairy buildings and into this construction was correlated the teaching of mathematics, mechanical drawing and manual training.

Four years later this work still continued and the club under the same leader took as their project the planning of buildings and equipment necessary for the successful operation of a four hundred acre stock ranch that has been successfully operating for the past 20 years five miles from Lorane. The correlation of the project not only carried the drawing of plans for the building to be constructed but also in the location of the corners, the surveying over the abstract and deeds of the farm. A complete farm management of the study of the farm was necessary in order to determine the size and type of building to be constructed.

Ten buildings are in the process of construction and work on them is being rushed to completion by the members of the club in order to have them ready for the annual trade show to be held in Eugene in May.
