Of course, other foods such as whole grain cereal and bread, meat or fish, and butter are needed too to furnish energy, some of the building material, to give variety, and to make meals more palatable and enjoyable.

The parade which will be held on Friday, June 7th, will have more big Portland floats entered than previously, according to Jack Converse, parade chairman. Interest in the parade is further advanced than at a comparable date in any previous year, according to Converse.

AZALEAS BLOOMING AT STATE PARK NOW

The flowers in Azalea State Park are at their best now according to the touring department of the Oregon State Motor association. Azalea State Park is located near the south city boundaries of Brookings on U. S. highway 101.

The park was set aside by the state upon the request of the local people. The park is 25 acres of natural pasture land which is left entirely alone, except for the occasional removal of dead or choked growth. In a part of the park the largest group of myrtle wood tables and benches have been constructed to provide for picnics.

Although the Azaleas are particularly beautiful now, the blooms are found in the park during every month of the year. The mildness of the adjoining region allows residents to plant garden peas and potatoes in the fall for early crops. Roses, fuschias, geraniums, lilies, and many members of the iris family bloom the year round.

ANIMALS GIVEN TESTS

Nearly 9,000 cattle were tested for tuberculosis, with 22 reactors, and another 36,580 were tested for Bang's disease, according to the March reports of the animal division of the state department of agriculture. Forest Service Wants A New Wild Area

Preliminary approval has been given to reclassify the Mountain Lakes primitive area on the Rogue River national forest as the Mountain Lakes wild area, and to increase its size to 23,071 acres, according to assistant regional forester F. V. Horton, in charge of the division of recreation and lands, North Pacific region. This tract is in Klamath county between Upper Klamath Lake and Lake of the Woods.

"The lowest point in this area is about 5,000 feet, and two-thirds of it is over 6,000 feet high," said Horton. "Mt. Harriman, 7,950 feet, is the highest point. The entire surface is rough and most of it is timbered. A rim of high peaks surrounds a central basin. A number of picturesque lakes lie in this basin, and most of them are stocked with eastern brook and rainbow trout. The plan is to keep plenty of trout in the lakes that can support them. Blacktail deer are common. Bear, coyotes, and the small furbearers are often seen. Geese, ducks, and occasionally pelicans use the lakes."

"All the primitive areas in this region are being studied and classified according to their use and size," Horton said. "Commercial uses will be kept out and the original wild state preserved as far as it is consistent with use for camping and similar forms of recreation and with protection from fire. Trails will be improved and camps provided, but only the most essential structures will be built."

Notices of the proposal to create this wild area now are being posted, and if no valid objections are received within 90 days, final approval can be given by the chief of the U. S. forest service.

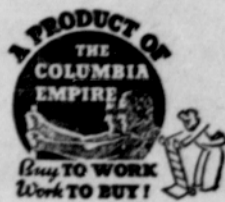
