

500 FFA Members Have Busy Time At OSC Meeting

George Stout of Cottage Grove Wins First in Public Speaking.

Exactly 500 high school agricultural students and their instructors and advisers took part in the annual convention of the Future Farmers of America at Oregon State college. The three-day program was crowded with business sessions of the organization, scores of contests, and a fair amount of recreation.

State officers chosen for next year are Glen Klowbo, Lebanon, president; Lawrence Johnson, Scappoose, vice president; Bill Wolfe, Walla, secretary; Francis Stupfel, Amity, treasurer; Rich Halousek, Milan, reporter. Faculty members of the executive committee are Bob Dietrick, West Linn; Frank Rood, Molalla, and Ira Forey, Lebanon.

The old state executive committee had an unusually difficult task of selecting the best from among the 52 chapters represented, and the outstanding individuals who were competing for the State Farmer degree. As the result of their labors, 21 chapters were given the coveted Keystone rating, while 39 boys were awarded the State Farmer degree. High ranking, or Keystone chapters were those from Albany, Arlington, Corvallis, Dayton, Enterprise, Forest Grove, Gresham, Helix, Lakeview, Molalla, McMinnville, Myrtle Point, Nestucca, Newberg, Oregon City, Pendleton, Salem, Scappoose, Silverton, Woodburn, and Walla.

The Amity chapter, for the second consecutive year, won the state championship in the parliamentary procedure contest, with Redmond second and Gresham third. Members of the winning team were Francis Stupfel, president; Wallace Harding, vice president; Elvin Asher, secretary; Glenn Christensen, treasurer; Leonard Will, reporter, and J. E. Thomas, adviser.

In the annual alumni public speaking contest, George Stout of Cottage Grove won the state championship, with a speech on "Why a Farmer." Frank Knix of Eugene was second and Lawrence Johnson, Scappoose, third.

Secretary of State Earl Snell addressed one of the business meetings, urging the Future Farmers to take an active interest in public affairs and to help preserve American liberties in the years to come.

Thursday night of April 25, at 7 p. m., Stout repeated his speech over KOAC radio station.

In other state wide contests, Cottage Grove placed fourth in parliamentary procedure and sixth in the farm management contest.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR CLEAN-UP WEEK

The Oregon Roadside Council has designated the week of May 6 to 11 inclusive as annual Clean-up Week throughout the state. This movement has met with the approval of the governor and other state officials and has the endorsement of its affiliated membership of over 9000 citizens of Oregon.

The work of the Roadside Council is confined entirely to rural areas outside of incorporated towns and cities. A few suggestions are:

Make a survey of your community and the approaches to your nearest town or city and work to remove whatever is unsightly.

Repair or remove, when possible, broken fences and gates. Repair or remove old buildings and eliminate all debris, broken board piles and worn-out machinery that is visible from the highway.

Remove or screen dumps and automobile junk yards; remove tin cans and other rubbish from the roadside.

Rake and burn, if possible, all brush and weeds from the fence rows adjacent to the right-of-way.

If needed, plant trees or shrubbery, for such improvements add to the value of your property and to the beauty of the countryside.

Eliminate all snipe advertising signs and advertisements on buildings.

Persuade property owners to refuse billboard advertising on their property; to paint their buildings and to prune their trees and shrubbery.

Give your property and your community a general house-cleaning.

Make the countryside clean and attractive—and attempt to keep it so.

Creole Spinach

1 quart spinach
2 tbsp chopped parsley
4 tsp butter
4 eggs, well beaten
2 cups milk
1 cup grated Swiss cheese
1 tsp salt
½ tsp paprika.

Wash and chop spinach. Add parsley and cook in the butter for 10 minutes. Add well-beaten eggs to the milk and pour over the spinach. Add cheese and seasoning, turn into buttered casserole, place in a pan of hot water and bake in moderate oven (300 deg.) for ½ hour. Serves 6.

Lot Owners Urged Registration Gain Help with Cleanup In All South Lane County Precincts

Eighteen years ago the Cottage Grove Cemetery association, a purely voluntary organization, was formed to take care of the Masonic-I.O.O.F. cemetery and put it in proper shape for Memorial day. C. A. Bartell was the first president and served many years. Mrs. Clara A. Burkholder was secretary from the beginning, and always took an active part. Her father, John Charles Stouffer, a pioneer Mason, helped to lay out the site for this cemetery. At the first, lot owners were assessed \$7 per lot per year for this work. K. K. Mills is president, and Mrs. Green Pitcher treasurer now. Still the work goes on, and for this year, will begin about May 15th. We urge all lot owners to assist us to have this work done properly and to make this possible, we assess each lot owner but \$1. Local labor is employed and work done as economically as possible. Due to the big windstorm there are more tree limbs and trash than usual, and late rains make the grass higher than ever. Because this cemetery is located on a hillside all this grass must be cut by hand labor, and trucks employed to cart away trash. We had five truckloads last year. We clean-up the cemetery as a whole, and urge that lot owners do their share on their individual lots and assist us in the general work also. Let's make our cemetery a place to which we can point with pride, on Memorial Day, and not a neglected spot grown up with weeds and littered with trash.

GOP Gain

Making big gains in western Oregon counties, republicans lead the democrats 276,367 to 254,814, the total registration of 541,286 being an all-time primary record. The margin of the GOP is 21,553, according to tabulations from Salem Monday.

The republicans are ahead by 21,553, while two years ago their lead was 16,963. The total registration is 20,061 more than that of two years ago.
