Wheat Sold As
Beef Nets Good
Price in Trial

Oregon wheat fed to Oregon steers at the Oregon experiment station in Corvallis, this past winter, was "sold" at the rate of \$1.50 a bushel, or more than \$50 a ton. When allowance was made for labor costs in feeding and for interest on investment, the steers still paid out at the rate of \$10 a ton for oats and vetch hay used, and \$30 a ton, or 90 cents a bushel, for the wheat.

Reports of the results of this feeding trial were made at the annual steer feeders' day at the experiment station. The 16 head of baby beefs fed throughout the winter were shown to the visitors. All the animals were sleek and fat and apparently in condition to top the market.

The wheat used in the feeding experiment was part of that supplied to the experiment station by the agricultural adjustment administration for research purposes. It was obtained largely through the efforts of N. E. Dodd, western director of the AAA, and members of the Oregon congressional delegation.

"Results obtained in this feeding test here at the college were highly significant and indicate a possibility of a greatly increased industry in fattening Oregon livestock on Oregon wheat," says William A. Schoenfeld, dean and director of agriculture. "Other tests are being made at branch stations in various parts of the state with this wheat, results of which will soon be available."

B. W. Rodenwold, assistant professor in animal husbandry, who is in charge of the actual feeding work, reported that the steers used in the experiment were grade Herefords, bought on the Portland market last fall for \$7.25 a hundred. They were fed from five to six pounds of ground wheat per head per day, in addition to the hay. Analysis showed that this wheat contained 3 to 5 per cent more nutrients than the ordinary feeding grade of corn and barley.

The economic possibilities of such feeding were brought out by P. M. Brandt, head of the animal industries division, who said that Oregon produces a surplus of both feeder cattle and wheat, while Washington and California must import large quantities of beef.

AUTO INDUSTRIES USE MORE
STEEL THAN NAVY

The American Iron and Steel Institute has compiled figures to the effect that the automobile industry consumes more steel in one week than the United States Navy consumes in three years, according to W. R. McDonald, Portland, director of the Oregon State Motor association. Half of all steel manufactured comes from scrap, and scrap dealers last year sold 34,800,000 tons to the steel industry.

The Blue Book gives complete statistics on all votes cast on candidates and measures at both the primary and general elections of 1938 and gives the break-down by counties, parties and candidates.

Sale of Bonds
Reaches New High

Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau announced today that the total sales of savings bonds through March 31, 1940, aggregated in maturity value, more than \$3,860,273,475, and that purchases have been made by approximately 1,987,374 investors. The total represents average purchases of \$2,495,325 for each business day since March 1, 1935, when these bonds were first placed on sale. Deducting bonds redeemed, the maturity value of savings bonds outstanding on March 31, 1940, was approximately \$3,495,573,600.

Glen Ridge, New Jersey, leads the second class post offices, with a cash purchase of \$272,066.25 (maturity value \$362,675.) Chaska, Minnesota, leads all third class postoffices, having a cash purchase of \$80,887.50 (maturity value \$107,850).

The fourth class post offices are led once again by Plemons, Texas. This town led its class in 1938 with a cash purchase of \$99,637.50 (maturity value \$132,850), and this year it tops its class with the extraordinary amount of \$108,693.75 (maturity value \$144,925).

Approximately 16,000 post offices throughout the country sell United States savings bonds. Regional reports as to annual purchases at each of these offices and mail order purchases originating in their respective territories are being forwarded to the postmasters concerned.

Cottage Grove ranks 16th in the state in the per capita sales in 1939 with total sales aggregating \$20,268.75. The post office sales were \$12,337.50 and the difference between the total and the post office sales represents the mail order sales cleared through this office.

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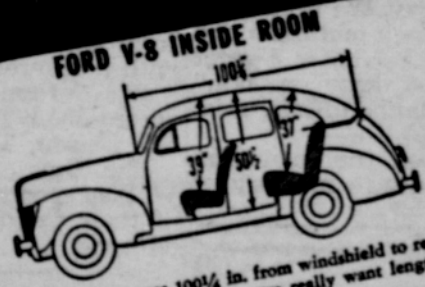


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
