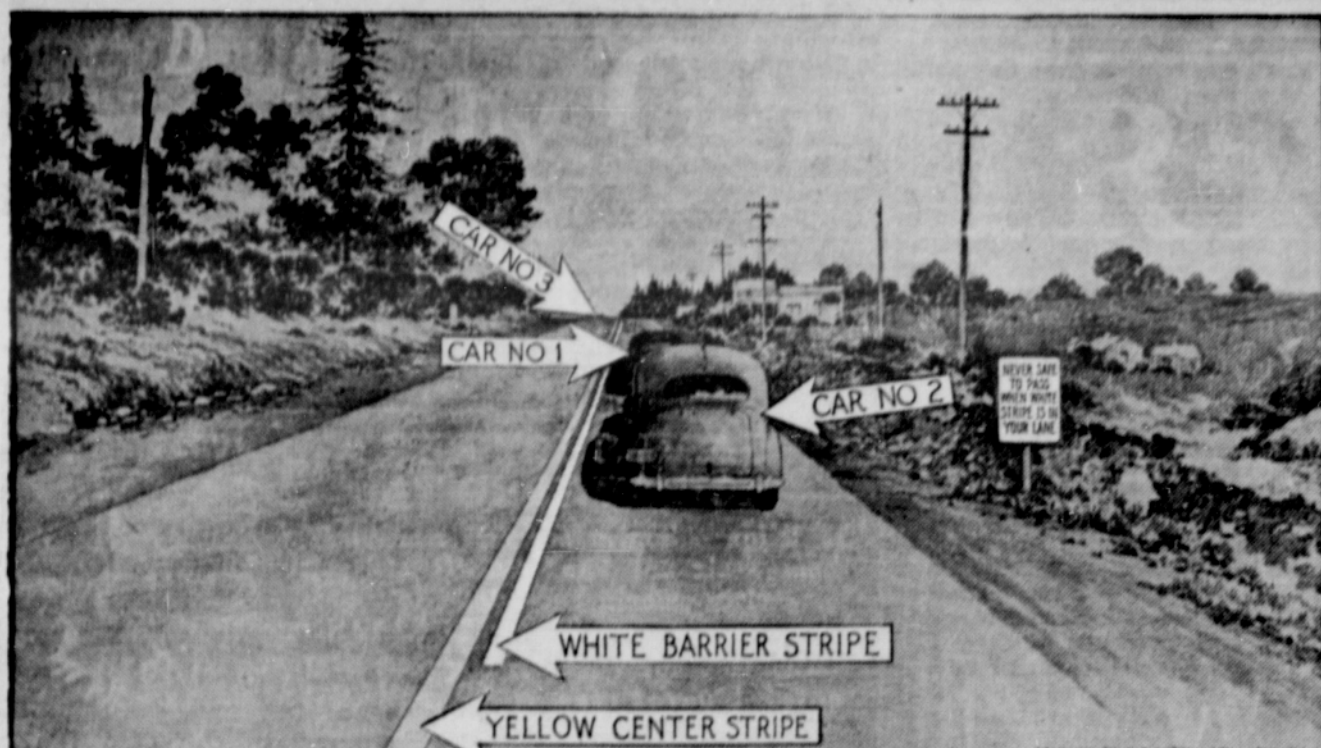




NO-PASSING-ZONE PAVEMENT MARKING

World Standard Time

In 1884 an international congress was called to consider the subject of world standard time. The world was divided into zones each covering 15 degrees longitude, the time for each zone being that of the meridian passing through its approximate center. The meridian passing through the observatory at Greenwich, England, was chosen as the meridian from which all time should be reckoned. This plan was gradually accepted by most nations of the world with few exceptions, of which Holland is the most notable. Holland goes by its own time which differs by 19 minutes and 32 seconds and a fraction from western European time.

WILD RODENTS NOW CHIEF SOURCE OF PLAGUE GERMS

Rural areas are now more likely to experience outbreaks of bubonic or pneumonic plague than are metropolitan centers, according to Dr. Frederick Meyer, director of the Hooper Institute of Medical Research at the University of California, in an address at Oregon State college sponsored by the school of science.

The reason for this, according to Dr. Meyer, is that wild rodents, rather than rats, are now the chief carriers of the plague infection. All species of squirrels are particularly subject to this disease. Hence, there is real danger in handling these animals, or in coming in contact with fleas from them.

Aluminum as Insulation

Reflecting sheets like aluminum foil show remarkable heat insulating properties, says a report to the American Chemical society. A single reflective sheet placed horizontally midway in the air space between a flat roof and the ceiling beneath can give an insulation value equivalent to three inches of cork board if the direction of heat flow is downward, as in the summer.
