CRESTED WHEAT GRASS
CAN "TAKE IT"

MORO—Evidence that crested wheat grass thrives best under use is seen by M. M. Oveson, superintendent of the Sherman branch experiment station. Pasture land on the station was seeded to crested wheat grass in the fall of 1937, after which stock was kept off for one year. In the spring of 1939 changes in the pasture fence resulted in part of the new grass being pastured heavily. During the extremely dry summer that year the grass that was pastured remained green longer and started better this spring than the grass allowed to remain ungrazed last year.

The Cottage Grove high school cindermen wound up their current schedule when the Springfield Millers edged them out 64½ to 57½ at Kelly field, Monday, May 20.

The meet marked the last appearance of seven seniors who are: Spies, Davenport, Hendricks, Chapman, Sarff, Earl, Davenport.

Times were good with six meet records being broken.

Bob Blackmore broke his own record in the low hurdles by 6 when he toured the distance in 25.3. Wimblery, Springfield, bested Dewey Ray's existing record in the 220, 1 in 23.7. Pollard and Davenport tied for first place in the high jump, at 5 feet 5 inches, pushing that record up 3 inches. McKibben heaved the football 173 feet 5 inches to better his record by 14 feet. Faye vaulted 10 feet 9 inches to raise his own record nine inches. Spies, Davenport, Krause and Blackmore ran the relay in 1:38.8 to clip a full second from the meet mark.
