

2 British Subjects Attend School.

Two British subjects who traveled half-way around a world at war, in order to attend the only school of its kind in existence, are safe in Detroit after a 13,000-mile voyage from the southernmost tip of Africa.

They are Charles B. C. Harris, of the Transvaal, and John D. Potgieter, Kimberley, South Africa, students in the Post-Graduate School of Modern Merchandising and Management, the only "university" of its kind in the auto industry. The institution is dedicated to the training of "second-generation" Chevrolet dealers.

A 35-day sea voyage in a war-infested world is not without its hazards, both young men agreed, although since they traveled aboard an American motor ship, the Challenger, the danger was minimized.

"Twice we saw submarines on patrol duty," Harris said, "and once our ship was halted by a French submarine, which had just put out from Martinique on patrol. No radio signals were exchanged, lest our position be revealed, thus exposing the submarine, but our captain explained his neutrality and listed his cargo by means of flag signals. The French U-boat commander apparently was satisfied, for we were not boarded and were detained less than an hour."

British freighters, which the American ship sighted off the coast of South America, were inclined to give the boat a wide berth until its identity was established, Portgieter said.

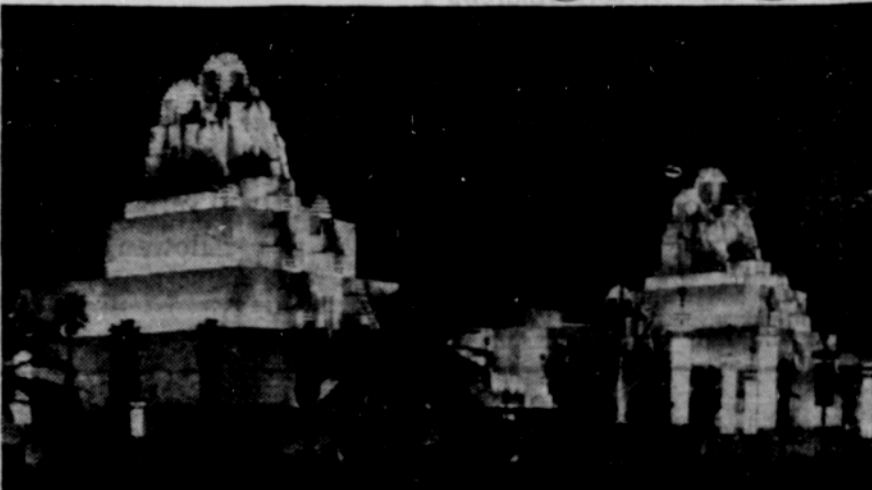
The city of Butte, Mont., has 10 times as many underground passages as it has streets. The tunnels are in copper and zinc mines.

Wheat Allotment 1940 and 1941 Same

Oregon wheat acreage allotments for 1941 are practically the same as for 1940, although considerably more than for 1939, according to word received from Washington by the state AAA committee. Oregon's allotment is 849,116 acres, compared with 851,458 acres in 1940, and 768,303 in 1939. The national allotment is 62 million acres, as it was in 1940.

Secretary Wallace announced that no marketing quotas for wheat will be proclaimed this year as the estimated production of 675 million bushels this year, plus a carry-over of 274 million bushels, gives a total below the figure where marketing quotas must be considered.

County allotments are being distributed soon, after which the county committees of farmers will apply these to individual farms.

During the past few weeks the Portland office of the commission has been flooded with applications accompanied with money orders and checks and all such applications are being returned to the senders by Frank B. Wire, State Game Supervisor.

"Until the Commission reaches a decision as to whether there is to be another cow elk season, we cannot accept applications," said Supervisor Wire. "After that decision has been made and in the event that another season is decided upon, we must then deter-

mine the method of distribution of the permits so all applicants will be given a fair deal. Then we will make an announcement and will be ready to receive applications."

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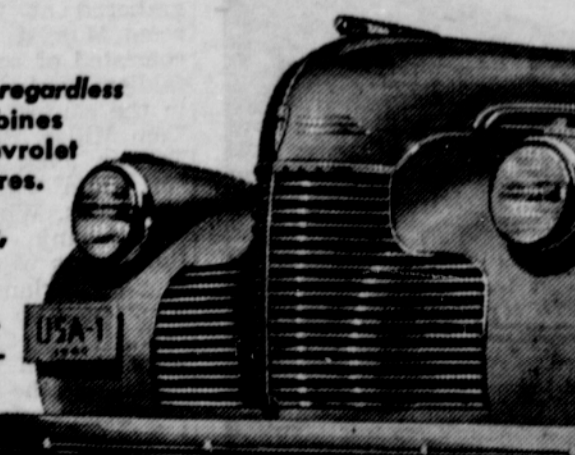
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
