

Here and There

7,500 Soldiers Come and Go
Seventy-five hundred soldiers stopped at the high school campus from Friday till Tuesday night, enroute from Fort Ord below San Francisco to Fort Lewis, Washington.

Local residents had opportunity to see the type of equipment used by the passing army except the light tanks, which were shipped by rail. Included in the contingents stopping here were the 15th infantry, the 7th infantry, the 3rd battalion of the 4th infantry, the 3rd quartermaster battalion, the 3rd medical battalion, the 10th engineer battalion, Company E of the 68th infantry, 3rd balloon squadron, 91st observation squadron, headquarters and military police company of the 3rd division and the 3rd ordnance.

Yes, the soldiers liked the camp ground provided at the high school, they said.

Local officers said yesterday no trouble of any kind was experienced with the 7,500 soldiers bivouaced here from Friday until yesterday morning. The soldiers were orderly at all times and although they visited all parts of town, if there was even as much as a cross word spoken between a civilian and a soldier, the fact was not recorded. Arrangements were in charge of Capt. R. C. Thomas, who saw to it that all movements went off like clock work from the time the soldiers arrived until the last contingent left camp.

Royalties on Songs

Royalties for popular songs vary, depending largely upon the individual arrangement. As a general rule, the song-writer will receive on a non-production number between two and three cents for regular sheet music copies, and about two cents for orchestration. For a production number, the songwriter will usually receive six cents for regular sheet music copies and about three cents for orchestration. Melody writer and lyric writer each receives one and one-half cents per copy of regular sheet music on a non-production number.

Air-Filtering Device

In an air-filtering device air is passed between two surfaces between which a high electric potential difference is maintained. Dust is precipitated on the surface at the lower potential by electrostatic attraction and ionic bombardment of the electric wind created by the corona discharge. Potential differences from several thousand volts up are used. Much higher voltages can be used in power plants for precipitating fly ash, since the ozone produced by the discharge goes out the stack and is therefore not objectionable.

JOBS FOR NYA

PORTLAND, May 22 — Private employment for every youth enrolled on the NYA program will be the goal of a "job-hunt" campaign now being conducted in the state, according to an announcement by Ivan G. Munro, state NYA administrator.

First step in the campaign was taken last week, Munro said, when all NYA employees on work-experience projects were directed to register before May 25 with the Oregon State Employment Service.

"This is the season," Munro stated, "When many jobs are available in Oregon. About 90 per cent of this year's seasonal agricultural labor will clear through the State employment Service. The lumbering industry is also dependent on the employment office for selecting many of its employees."

Lane County to Have Midget Auto Racing

Midget auto racing has provided fans through the nation with what they demand—punch. The new sport, growing in popularity by leaps and bounds on the Pacific coast since its introduction in California six years ago, will make its inaugural appearance in Lane county, Memorial Day, Thursday, May 30. The Veterans of Foreign Wars have contracted Bobby Rowe's Oregon Midget Auto Racing association for a series of six meets and the opener is expected to attract a crowd of something around 5,000 fans.

The nine-event program, including a 30-lap main event, will get under way at 2:30 p. m., immediately following trial runs that are scheduled to start at 1:30 p. m.

One of the leading performers in Eugene Memorial Day will Bill Gehlor, the San Francisco veteran who has been given the name of "Hard Luck Kid." He is usually one of the leaders early in the season and last year was pushed out of the championship money because of car trouble. He now sports a new job built by Bill Mills of Montana and is considered a strong contender for the O.M.A.R.A. trophy for 1940. Other outstanding drivers who will be among the field of 20 are Tommy Legge of San Diego, Tony West of Tacoma, Bert Bloomgren of Los Angeles and Dolph Danz of Spokane.

The second meet in Eugene is scheduled for July 4, followed by four night races.

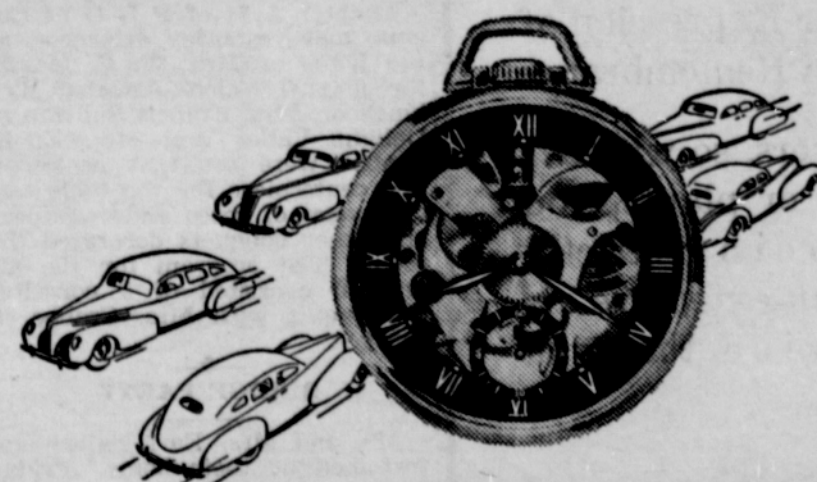
