O.S.C. READY TO GRADUATE 775 STUDENTS

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—This institution will celebrate its seventy-first annual commencement the week end of June 1 to 3 with ceremonies which will launch approximately 775 seniors and graduate students into their life work or continued advance study. Reports from all schools on the campus indicate a large percentage of graduates already placed in positions. Prospects for employment for graduates are markedly better in many lines and somewhat better in all divisions of the college compared with recent years.

Alumni day is Saturday, June 1, though the silver jubilee class of 1915 will meet first Friday evening. Sunday the impressive baccalaureate service will have as speaker the Reverend L. E. Kempton, pastor of Trinity Episcopal church of Portland, with the college chorus and symphony orchestra furnishing the music. Graduation exercises start at 10 o'clock Monday.

DOLLARS TAKE WINGS IF SOIL WASHES OR BLOWS

Every time a ton of good Columbia basin topsoil is either washed or blown away, the owner loses an average of \$2.57 worth of soil fertility elements, figured at current prices of commercial fertilizers. Such is the finding of Soil Conservation service agronomists after a study made with Palouse silt loam. The removal of one inch of soil, either by water or wind erosion, means the loss of about 125 tons per acre.

Heavy Tax Grist

Members of 44 state legislatures meeting in 1939 tossed 4,338 tax bills into the hoppers, of which 1,102 were ground out as laws, according to the National Consumers Tax commission.

Boston Will Finish On Top This Year
