

San Francisco Fair Opened Saturday

TREASURE ISLAND.—A bomb burst. A ribbon was cut, 123,368 eager men, women and children streamed onto Treasure Island on San Francisco bay to be participants in the gala opening of the 1940 Golden Gate International exposition.

That was last Saturday—a day during which a new page was written in the glamorous history of the west.

It is a new exposition that is swinging into its first week after a premiere marked by gay color and carefree enjoyment. It is new in theme and new in atmosphere—as new as ideas and ingenuity and imagination could make it.

It is a streamlined exposition, warm and friendly; a glittering fairyland where enjoyment and happiness reign supreme.

Visitors to Treasure Island for the second season seem to sense the change from the previous season. The buildings are the same, except for the new color that has been so generously utilized to give them new appeal. The courts and avenues are those that were trod by millions during the 1939, but aside from these things it is an entirely new exposition.

Guards, cashiers, ticket choppers, showmen and concessionaires all seem to have caught the new spirit that prevails. They meet the fair visitors with friendly smiles, intent on aiding him in the enjoyment of the manifold pleasures that have been provided for him.

And those pleasures are manifold! There are new shows, new exhibits and new concessions everywhere on the 400-acre man-made isle of joy. The great exhibit palace that last year housed the mines and metals exhibits has been transformed into a show palace. At the south end is the Pantheon, a thrilling panorama of the last World War. In the north end is the Hollywood Show-Stage 9, where the guest on Treasure Island may witness the making of a motion picture, with real performers, directors and technicians going through the same routine that is daily procedure in the large Hollywood studios.

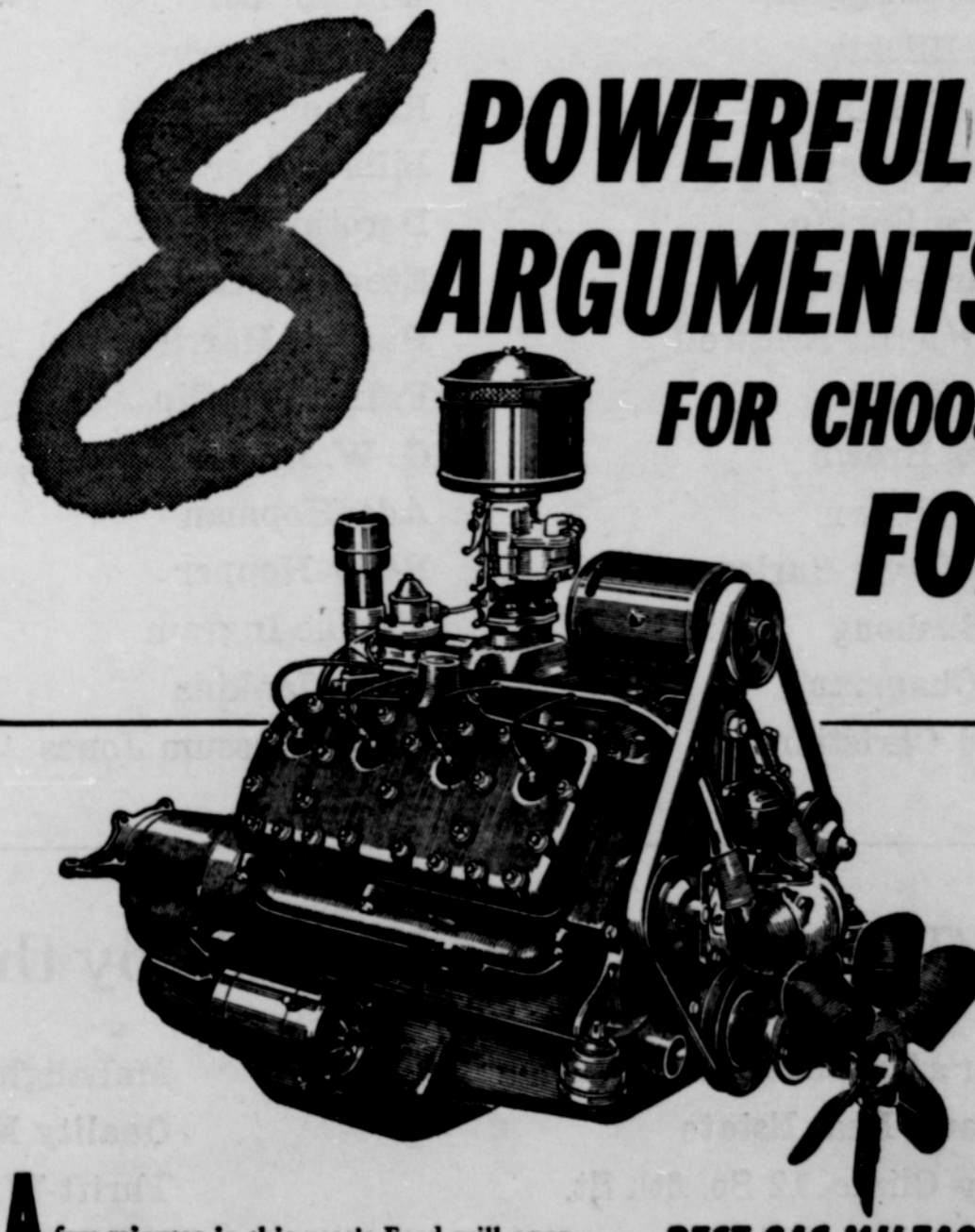
