Oregon Assigned 985 Enrollees for Month of July

The Civilian Conservation Corps has assigned to Oregon a quota of approximately 985 enrollees for the July enrollment of the Civilian Conservation Corps. Lane County's portion of the quota will be about 50 enrollees.

The purpose of the Civilian Conservation Corps is to provide employment and furnish training for 300,000 youthful citizens of the United States who are unemployed and in need of employment, and to accomplish work on national and state forests, in parks, and other lands where such work will contribute to the welfare of the country as a whole.

In order to be eligible for selection for junior enrollment in the Civilian Conservation Corps, the applicant must be a male citizen of the United States by birth or completed naturalization; not less than 17 years of age, nor more than 23 1/2 years of age on the enrollment day, in good physical condition, of good character and stability of purpose.

There are in each camp in connection with the work project and camp administration, a sizable number of opportunities to obtain basic training applicable to specific payroll jobs in industry and agriculture, as well as continuation of grade and high school subjects.

Each enrollee must be willing to allot \$22.00 per month of his cash allowance to his dependents, or, if he has no dependents, to save \$22.00 every month and deposit that sum with the chief of finance, war department. Anyone interested in enrolling in the Civilian Conservation Corps or desiring more complete information concerning the July enrollment should contact the office of the Lane County Public Welfare Commission, 1211 Alder Street, Eugene, or phone 1700 at once.

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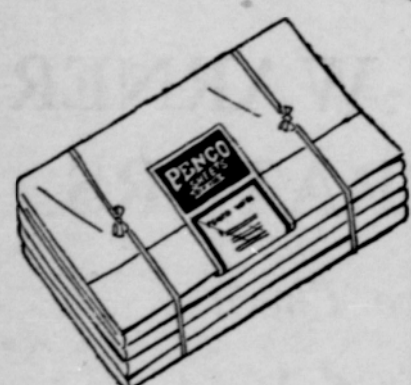
