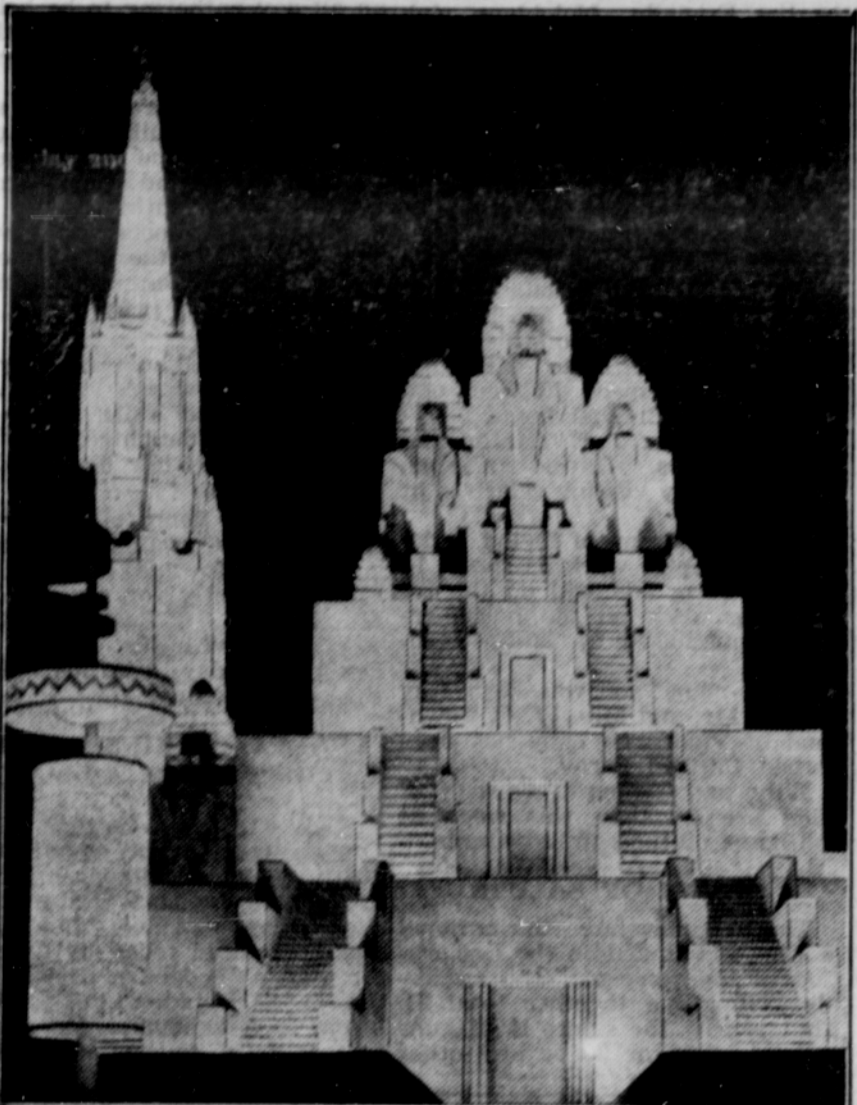
### Area Navy Quota Is Increased 100

In connection with the navy's expansion program, which calls for an increase of enlisted personnel to 170,000 men, the quota of sixty recruits assigned the Portland recruiting district for the month of June, has been increased to 100, it was announced today by Lieutenant Commander L. B. Stuart, Portland navy recruiting officer. This large quota has been exceeded only once during the period since the President declared as "Limited National Emergency" last September. Local waiting lists have been entirely depleted and men now applying for enlistment are usually accepted within thirty days from the date of application.

Plans for further expansion of recruiting activities within the Portland Recruiting district, which includes the state of Oregon, eastern Washington and northern Idaho, are now in process of completion. In addition to the permanent sub-stations now being maintained at Medford, Marshfield and Corvallis, in Oregon, and Spokane and Walla Walla, Washington, it is planned to place part-time stations at Hood River, Astoria and Bend on a full-time basis. A new permanent sub-station will be established in the city of Eugene in the near future and part-time offices will be operated in Salem, Roseburg, Grants Pass, Klamath Falls and La Grande, Oregon and Lewiston, Idaho.

The personnel of the district recruiting force is being augmented by four chief petty officers.

#### OUTBOARD MOTOR IS INDISPENSABLE TO FISHING

The modern fishing kit, in addition to space for lines, reels, lures and rods, has got to have another theoretical partition added to accommodate the outboard motor, according to Joe Smith, local motor dealer, who reports that in 1940 the outboard has become a thoroughly indispensable item of fishing equipment.

"In practically all states today, trolling with a motor is permitted and most fishermen are in a hurry to get there and back, and as a result, the actual physical effort of fishing has been immeasurably reduced. The net result is a better vacation, or a more enjoyable week-end, if that's all the time a fisherman has at his disposal," he states.

Commenting on the physical reasons for use of a motor, Joe Smith declares that "an outboard is a far better friend to the average fisherman than he perhaps realizes himself. He probably bought it originally because it made the work lighter. Actually, in making that decision, he was doing himself a good turn without knowing it. The simple fact is that those of us spend most of our lives working in an office are probably not physically fitted for undertaking the strain of rowing a boat for long periods of time."

"But aside from easing up on the toil that would otherwise be involved in the sport of fishing, the motor has another side in its appeal to fishermen because of the very evident fact that most fishermen enjoy the possession of mechanical apparatus. Whether it's because of the fact that we're a nation of born mechanics, or because there's a basic pleasure in being able to pilot a ship, if even a very small one, it's a fact that few fishermen who have once owned an outboard motor are ever found without an outboard motor again.

"Time was when weight was a material factor that might possibly have kept a fisherman from owning a motor, but within the past few years the manufacturers have licked the weight problem and efficient powerful motors are now found in the brackets from 30 pounds on down. As an item of fishing tackle, the outboard has become as standard as the rod and reel itself."
