## C. Howard Rites Held Here Monday

Funeral services for Charles J. Howard, 74, were held at the Mills Chapel, Monday afternoon at 2:30 p. m. with the Rev. W. V. McGee, officiating. Interment was in the local I.O.O.F.-Masonic cemetery.

Mr. Howard, prominent in sectional and state affairs, died at a Salem hospital May 30th, following a long illness. Born at Monticello, Iowa, October 10, 1866, Mr. Howard came west with his parents and stopped at Tacoma, Washington, a short time later moving to Salem, where he was employed for a time on the Salem Statesman.

In 1887 the family moved to Eugene and he married Miss Minnie Abrams of Eugene. In 1899 he established in Cottage Grove, his own newspaper, the Bohemia Nugget. Later he served two terms as postmaster here, resigning in 1908 to manage the Chambers general store at Dorena. The immediate family of Mr. Howard have resided in the Dorena community for the past twenty years. Surviving are his widow, a daughter Francis and two sons, Harold B. Howard of Dorena, and Claude M. Howard of San Bruno, California.
