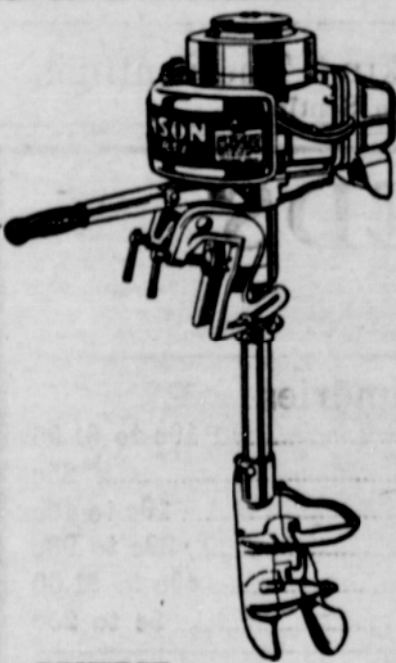

So far as the hotel's 23c of each visitor's dollar is concerned, it is distributed in this manner: 31c for payroll; 29c for supplies, etc., 19c for food, merchandise, beverages, cigars, etc., 9c for depreciation and 6c for insurance and tips.
