ASKS SUPPORT FOR MURAL

Dorena Boy Wins In Rodent Contest

Garland Hocker of Dorena, in the Southern Lane district which includes all communities south of Elmira-Noti road and Willamette river, turned in the highest score in the annual 4-H club rodent control contest with a total of 101,625 points.

Second place in the contest and winner in the northern district was James Wearin with a total of 79,925 points. Third place in the contest and winner in the western district was Wayne Bishop with a total of 72,175 points.

Winners in each of these three districts will receive a .22 calibre rifle.

Honorable mention in the contest goes to Bob Merz of Fiddle Creek, Vivian Pollock of Saginaw, Gerald Mead of Herman, Averill Hanson of Swamp, Virginia Futrelle of Noti, Delbert Alsop of Walden, Louis Hendrix of Alsea, Vernon Parker of Dexter, Allan Spores of Hebron, Geneva McClane of Westfir, James Wilcox of Lorane, Leo Susbauer of Dexter, Henry Sindt of Mapleton, Ford Hendrick of Hadleyville, Billy Bryan of Elmira, and David Kempston of Lorane.

Champion rodent catchers according to classification include: Garland Hocker of Dorena caught 257 rats, James Wearin of Deerhorn caught 533 grey diggers, Allen Sports of Crow caught 27 rabbits, Gerald Mead of Herman caught 28 gophers, Garland Hocker caught 945 mice, Bob Merz of Duffie Creek caught 84 moles, Wayne Bishop of Portage caught 256 mountain beaver and 12 crows, Geneva McClane of Westfir caught 78 jays.

The total number of rodents in the 1940 contest caught were 16,632, which is an increase over 1939 when there were 14,762 caught.

Included in the 16,632 caught were 2346 rats, 2552 grey diggers, 529 rabbits, 373 gophers, 8710 mice, 844 moles, 495 mountain beaver, 55 crows and 728 jays.

In the three district group contests, the Southern Lane, District No. 13, was won by Dorena with a score of 121,050 points and as such the winner of a \$250 district prize and a \$250 grand champion prize. In district No. 1, Western Lane, the \$250 prize was won by Portage with a score of 97,250, and in District No. 2, Northern Lane, the \$250 prize was won by Deerhorn with a score of 84,550.
