John Sevar Owens died Sunday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. J. M. Eastham, 336 North H street. He was born May 27, 1860 in Huntsville, Tennessee and was a retired shoemaker. He was married July 18, 1880 in Scott county, Tennessee to Nellie Roysdon. Surviving are his wife, three daughters, Mrs. Eastham, Mrs. Ida Webb of Portland, Mrs. Marie Schroeder of Klamath Falls, one son, William Owen of Salem, one brother, Gidney Owen of Tennessee and six grand children. He was a member of the Four Square Gospel church. Mr. Owens had lived in Oregon for 23 years coming from Tennessee. He came to Cottage Grove three years ago and has since resided at the home of Mrs. Eastham.

Funeral services were held in the Mills chapel at 10:30 a. m. Wednesday with the Rev. Gordon L. Hypes officiating. Interment was at Banks, Oregon.

**Notice of School Election to Approve Budget**

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN To the legal voters of Union High School District No. 14, Lane County, Oregon, that an election will be held in the Music Room, Union High School Building, Cottage Grove, Lane County, State of Oregon, in said Union High School District No. 14, Lane County, Oregon, on the 24th day of June, 1940, between the hours of 2:00 o'clock P. M. and 7:00 o'clock P. M. of said day, for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters of said district the question of approving the budget for the fiscal year beginning June 24, 1940, and ending June 23, 1941, as heretofore approved by the budget committee and the Board of Directors of said district, and to vote on the proposition of levying a tax for the year 1941.

The postal officials are at all times pleased to give the patrons of outlying district plenty of money order blanks in order to eliminate having the carriers fill out the blanks for the customers. This

will make it much easier all the way around and stop all the trouble that might come from erroneous names and amounts that might be put in the money order blanks.
