

Four-Lane Route Approved by State

The Oregon State highway commission has placed their stamp of approval upon the proposed four-lane highway between Eugene and Springfield. The proposed route would mean widening of Broadway from High street to make a four-lane route to the junction. It would also eliminate several grade crossings by moving the Southern Pacific railroad tracks toward the river and placing the highway on the south side of the tracks.

Work on the million dollar job may begin this summer, however, the program depends upon federal funds for the grade crossing eliminations and for regular federal aid money which must come from the U. S. senate.

News Briefs

According to a report it seems likely that the "lakes" caused by the building of several dams in Lane county might be used for hydroplane bases. A survey is being made of the possible sites for landing places for boat-bottomed aircraft and these lakes would seem to fit the requirements.

WPA men are going to begin clearing and grubbing activities on the Hebron dam project around July 8. At the same time WPA men will start the same activities on the Fern Ridge project.

Agitation seems to be under way in Japan for that country to start action along such lines as seizing French Indo-China. This agitation probably would not stop with just that territory, but might include the Dutch East Indies which would bring Japan and the United States at odds with each other.

Portland Chamber of Commerce is trying to get some of the war industries for that city. The city officials were quick to see the gain for the Rose City if they could get some of the big war industries to come to the west.

Harold Swartz, former manager of the Irish-Swartz store here, lost out on the 36th hole of his championship golf match for the championship of the Eugene Country club. His victor was Bert Prescott, a highly rated golfer of Eugene.

The city of Astoria is getting somewhat of a realistic view of war. The rumble of heavy guns can be heard in that city from Camp Clatsop where the Oregon National Guard is now in training.

Marshfield may become a market place for chrome if the present war keeps up in Europe. There are deposits of chrome on the beach south of Marshfield, it is reported.

While the battles rage on in Europe, many people of this country will have their ears tuned to the radio tomorrow evening at 7 p. m., when Joe Louis and Arthur Godoy tangle in the ring in New York city. The fight will be broadcast over the NBC network, it was announced yesterday afternoon.

William W. Harcombe, Eugene attorney, who is now serving a sentence in the state penitentiary, lost his fight against disbarment when the state supreme court upheld the ruling.

In view of the fact that Russia has cleared a pathway for troop movements by the bloodless conquest of the smaller nations lying between the Russian border and Germany-occupied part of Poland, it is a remote, but nevertheless a possible chance that the Russian bear and the British lion might shake hands to stem the rush of the German hord since Russia finds herself in a position to gain little if Hitler defeats England and after a short rest casts his eyes toward the Danube.

A preliminary survey of the number of farms in Lane county, made by the Supervisor of the 1940 Census of Agriculture, shows the number of farms as of April 1, 1940 to be 4,483 as compared with 4,649 on January 1, 1935, and 4,088 on April 1, 1930. The 1940 figure is preliminary and subject to correction.

GIRLS STATE GATHERING PLANNED BY AUXILIARY

Local High School Girl Graduate to Attend

Announcement was made recently by Mrs. Hester Reed, Unit Americanism chairman for the American Legion Auxiliary, that plans were completed Monday night to send Miss Betty Adkins to Girl State from the local unit. Mrs. Reed stated that Girl State would be patterned after the Beaver State for boys, which the American Legion has conducted for several years. The principal purpose of Girl State is to train girls showing leadership ability in the practical working of the U. S. democratic government. The camp will be open from June 23 to June 30 at Silver Creek Falls for a selected group of girls from all parts of Oregon. The program of government will be in charge of Mrs. Dorothy McCullough Lee, state senator from Multnomah county. She will be assisted by department Americanism committees of the American Legion Auxiliary. Said Mrs. Reed: "There is a definite need for special training in citizenship showing qualities of leadership. America can be truly served and the principles of freedom and democracy perpetuated by developing future leaders among our young women who are mentally, physically and spiritually equipped to participate actively in the affairs of the government." It was the desire, Mrs. Reed said, that two girls could be sent from here; that some other organization could send one; however, registrations for the session closed June 10 with the camp facilities taxed to the limit by the 125 registrations accepted.
