OREGON STATE COLLEGE.—The senior class just graduated from O.S.C. was a "home product," so to speak, as 711 of the 790 members were Oregon boys and girls. Nineteen other states, Alaska, British Columbia, and China were represented by the remainder of the class.

Multnomah led the counties in numbers with an even 200, followed by Benton county with 117. Counties next in order were Marion, 42; Lane, 32; Clackamas, 26; Umatilla, 21; Linn and Washington, 19 each. Every county was represented, Gilliam, Morrow and Wheeler having one each.

Ages of the graduates ranged from 20 to 48 for women and 20 to 56 for men. Youngest was Aileen May Duerst, McMinnville, who was born February 24, 1920.

U. of O. Professor Compares Students

Dr. E. H. Moore, professor of sociology at the University of Oregon, paid a visit to the Sentinel office one day last week. Dr. Moore, assisted by Miss Naette Schmuki, student of U. of O., is gathering information on the high school graduates of past years and comparing those of the 1890's with those of today according to ability, etc. In his research thus far he has found that a greater percentage of today's graduates are staying in the state and vicinity from which they graduated than in the years gone by. The information is obtained through contact with the graduates, the schools and the newspapers. A survey is now being made of Cottage Grove, Dallas, Gresham and Woodburn with Cottage Grove first on the list. Dr. Moore has almost completed a survey of Hanover, Michigan, where he graduated from high school. He hopes to have the necessary material for the present survey gathered and put into printed form within a few months.

HIGHWAY BILL

Washington, D. C.—(By Highway Information Service)—The United States House of Representatives passed the 1940 federal aid highway bill last week. This legislation authorizes the appropriation of \$178,500,000 for highway construction for the fiscal years 1942 and 1943.

The amounts originally recommended by the May 1 report of the House Roads Committee totaled \$238,000,000. These are reduced 25 per cent in the bill as approved. The reduction amounts to \$59,500,000 and was agreed to by a special meeting of the roads committee, Wednesday, May 29. The paired amounts now carried in the bill provide \$357,000,000 for highway construction for the two fiscal years. Regardless of the 25 per cent reduction, the total shows an increase of \$7,500,000 over the amount authorized by the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1938.

Marine Corps to Take Recruits

The United States marine corps recruiting office in the U. S. court house at Portland has been authorized to accept an unlimited number of men for enlistment during the month of June, according to word received today from Captain James B. Hardie, officer in charge of marine corps recruiting activities in the Portland district.

This, Captain Hardie stated, is due to the fact that Congress has authorized the expansion of the marine corps to 34,000 enlisted men, its greatest peace time strength. Due to this great increase, promotion will be faster than it has been at any time during the past twenty years, the captain said.

Branch recruiting offices are being opened at Boise, Idaho, and Walla Walla, Washington, to help in handling the increase.

Male United States citizens between the ages of 18 and 30, without dependents, of good habits and character, and in good health, are eligible for enlistment.

OSC ENGINEERING SCHOOL "ENLISTED FOR DEFENSE"

OREGON STATE COLLEGE.—The school of engineering will be busy this summer in a program of cooperation with the federal government on national defense, the full extent of which is not yet determined.

Already the department of mechanical engineering has been authorized to continue the pilot training course under the Civil Aeronautics administration. At least 50 new men will be accepted for training for a three-months period starting about June 15. These men will be provided training without cost and will be given the same work for which a charge of \$40 was made this last year.

The college has also responded to a request to make available the facilities of the school of engineering in an extensive training program in connection with national defense measures in mechanical warfare. It is possible that this program may also get under way this summer, although definite arrangements have not been completed, according to President G. W. Peavy.

LOCAL PONTIAC SALES SHOW BIG INCREASE

Continuing the steady gains that have been made in Pontiac sales in the Portland zone, C. C. Currie, zone manager, reports that according to latest complete figures available, Pontiac registrations in the entire zone for the first quarter of 1940 show an increase of 65.6 per cent over the same period of 1939 compared to a gain of 38.8 per cent for the entire automobile industry for the same two periods.
