FLOOR TAX ON CIGARETTES

J. W. Maloney, Collector of Internal Revenue, stated today that all wholesale and retail dealers in cigarettes would be subject to payment of a floor tax, based on the increase in the tax on cigarettes under the Revenue Act of 1940. The new law becomes effective July 1, 1940.

Collector Maloney stated that all dealers having cigarettes for sale must make an inventory of their stock on hand as of the close of business June 30, 1940. This is to be prepared in duplicate, listing brands and quantities of each brand. It is to be held by the dealer; and he is to notify the Collector of Internal Revenue, 210 Custom House, Portland, Oregon, immediately, requesting a form on which to file the floor-tax return. As soon as the printed floor-tax returns are received from the Bureau at Washington, they will be mailed to dealers, with instructions as to preparation, computation of tax, etc.
