**Lets 300,000 Mosquitoes Bite Him To Find Perfect Insect Repellent**

Young Research Worker on University Staff Real "Iron" Man

WHILE other people try to keep away from mosquitoes during the summer months, Philip Granett, young "iron" man at Rutgers University, goes to a great deal of trouble to get them to bite him. He has endured more than 300,000 bites to help make it possible for other folks to escape insect annoyance.

Granett is one of a group of scientists at Rutgers who, under a grant from the National Carbon Company, are studying insect reactions to various chemicals. They have been working on this one problem for five years. As a result, they have already succeeded in making a repellent lotion that not only prevents mosquitoes from biting but keeps them at a distance.

Granett's job in this research has been that of a human guinea pig. He has tried out on himself the hundreds of chemical combinations produced by the laboratory staff to learn which solution would work best.

His method has been to take a sample of the chemical to be tested, stand in a mosquito bog, roll up sleeves and trousers, and apply a measured amount of the repellent to one arm and one leg. The other arm and leg have been left unprotected. Then the number of bites received on the untreated parts of his body were counted.

Bites were counted until Granett got one on the arm or leg having the repellent coating. As soon as that happened, he noted the time that had elapsed since the test began, and the experiment was over. His purpose, of course, was to find a chemical combination that would extend the protection time as long as possible.

Day after day Granett has gone through this routine, trying out one chemical after another. During the summer he has stood in swamps under a boiling sun. In winter has been bitten by mosquitoes especially raised in the Rutgers laboratories at New Brunswick, N. J. Every one of the thirty-five kinds of mosquitoes found in New Jersey has had a chance to feed on him, Granett says. Along with them are many others of the 350 varieties that exist in different parts of the United States.

Granett's endurance has been finally rewarded. The laboratory staff reports that it has developed a lotion that withstands all tests better than any other. Not only does this substance offer protection against mosquitoes, but it keeps away gnats, sand flies, black flies, deer flies, chiggers and similar pests. One application may last as long as three hours.

**Annual Report of AAA Says Oregon Farms Prepared**

The AAA farm program, with its encouragement of conservation and assistance in marketing, has helped materially in increasing Oregon's "agricultural preparedness," says the newly-released annual report for 1939 of the Oregon agricultural conservation committee.

"At the time this report is being prepared," says the publication, "the word 'preparedness' is on the lips of everyone. No matter what America's future duties become, Oregon farmers will be prepared to help with supplying food."

"Since the beginning of the AAA (in 1933), Oregon's farm lands have been improved and farmers have gained in security and efficiency. The AAA organization, having 174 county committeemen and 1026 community commitment in Oregon, would be ready at moment's notice to operate effectively in meeting demands upon the state's agriculture."

More than 36,000 Oregon farmers participated in the 1939 farm program, representing about 94 per cent of the state's crop land. They received about six million dollars in federal payments.

With Oregon's total agricultural income for 1939 well above 100 million dollars AAA payments were less than 6 per cent of this amount; yet, they acted as a powerful incentive to better farming, the report points out.

Among aids to Oregon agriculture in 1939, as listed in the report, were adjustment of wheat acreage in line with demand, crop loans to wheat growers, crop insurance on wheat, financial aid to sugar beet and fiber flax growers, improvement of water and grass resources on the range, and promotion of conservation aids such as lime, phosphate, cover crops, trashy fallow, crested wheat grass, legumes and perennial grasses.

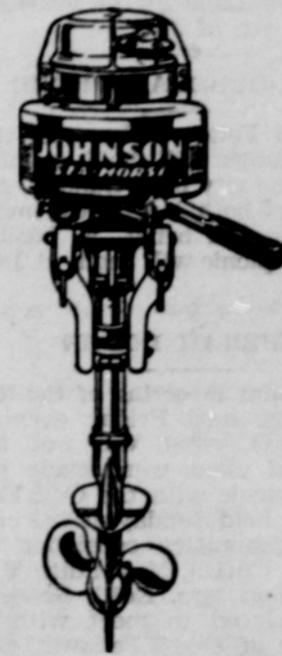
