

Creswell to Get Bonneville Line

Press reports state that definite assurance has been given the Lane county rural electrification project that a 60,000 volt electric line will be extended from the Bonneville sub-station at Eugene to Creswell. Such a step was announced at a meeting of the county rural electrification meeting at Eugene Friday and legal papers were issued at the meeting which will shortly release funds necessary for the construction of the line to serve the Dorena and other REA districts. Construction may be expected to start shortly on the line according to Frank Bennett, coordinator. Surveys of the line through the McKenzie and Central Loran areas are about completed, it was learned.

Three additional members were elected to the board of directors Friday including Tom Wilson, Fall Creek; Lawrence Porter, Lynx Hollow, and Claude Arne of Dorena.

Officials of the project expressed a hope that a general speed up of the project would result from the meeting.

Hall Addition on Main Street Well Underway
