War Is Hardship British Motorists

Motorists in the United States can count themselves lucky when they consider the plight of the British motorist as revealed in reports reaching the Oregon State Motor association.

A war-tax of 25 shillings (about \$6.25) per horse-power has been placed on all motor vehicles. The average American light car develops an S.A.E. horsepower of about 30—and would mean a tax in excess of \$180 a year. In addition to this tax, there is a tax of 18 cents per gallon on petrol.

The petrol itself has been strictly rationed with cars of more than 20 horsepower receiving the maximum rationing of 10 gallons per month. Certain professional men who need the motor car in their work receive up to 20 gallons a month.

Another hardship that the British motorist is facing is the complete absence of highway and road markers. Immediately after the start of the war all signposts were removed, and motorists must "pioneer" their way when off the main highways.

Because of the lack of petrol about 25 percent of the private cars of Great Britain are out of service and as a result many of the garages and filling stations have been closed.

No new cars have been manufactured since the outbreak of the war because the factories are being used for munitions work—and the price of all cars, both new and used, has risen about ten per cent.

SANITATION AVAILABLE

The state board of health and the United States public health service through the cooperation of the Works Projects Administration are again giving families living in unsewered areas the advantages of replacing old insanitary pit-prives with approved fly proof privies having improved features.

The buildings are constructed using materials furnished by the property owners, but the time required by the workers for the construction and installation of the buildings is furnished gratis through the community sanitation project, operated by the Work Projects Administration.

Property owners, school districts, business operators, camp ground operators, or organizations can secure the advantages available through the operation of the community sanitation project by arranging with a lumber dealer for the purchase and delivery of the materials required for construction. All details incident to the fabrication and installation of the approved type privies will then be performed gratis by the W.P.A. project operation.

Amount of Feed Required for Chicks

One often hears the comment, "You have no idea how much feed it takes to feed that flock; 100 pounds of feed lasts no time."

One should have some idea, because feed represents close to 60 percent of the total expense in operating a poultry enterprise, and adequate feeding is essential for successful results.

So here are the figures:

100 CHICKS WILL EAT 10 pounds of feed the 1st week, 20 pounds of feed the 2nd week, 30 pounds of feed the 3rd week, 40 pounds of feed the 4th week.

100 CHICKS WILL EAT 100 pounds the first 4 weeks, 360 pounds the first 8 weeks, 765 pounds the first 12 weeks, 1,255 pounds the first 16 weeks, 1,825 pounds the first 20 weeks, 2,475 pounds the first 24 weeks.

Now perhaps you'd like to know how much feed it takes to make one pound of chicken:

To 8 weeks—3.5 lbs. of feed. 8-16 weeks—5.5 lbs. of feed. 16-24 weeks—9 lbs. of feed.

For larger birds, feed requirements are: 25 lbs. to feed 100 hens daily, 25 lbs. to feed a pullet to laying age, 60 lbs. to feed a turkey to market age.

Some variation from these figures may be expected in individual flocks, but they can be considered accurate enough for determining probable feed costs on growing chicks.

Another Fish Story

A salt water fish can swim over and look a fresh water fish in the eye in a canal at Coral Gables, Fla., without either leaving its favorite medium. The reason is that an underground stream breaks through the limestone crust and flows at a 5,000-gallon-a-minute rate into the canal near where it empties into salty Biscayne bay. Black bass and other fresh water fish live in the vicinity of the spring. In other parts of the canal and in the bay there are such salt water denizens as snappers and bonito.
