NEW BROADCASTING SYSTEM POSSIBLE

Radio Ray Nelson spent last Thursday and Friday in Portland inspecting the new radio lines for the 1941 season. He reports much interest among the trade in the new frequency modulation system of broadcasting and receiving. This system promises an almost noise-free type of reception, not affected by local electrical disturbances, which so often mar the present broadcasts. It is understood that at least one and possibly two Portland stations will be built to broadcast this new type of radio wave.

S. P. PURCHASES PACIFIC TRUCK EXPRESS

Purchase by Southern Pacific company this month of the Pacific Truck Express will greatly increase Southern Pacific's capacity to serve Oregon shippers, according to Herman W. Klein, general freight agent, Portland.

The Pacific Truck Express provides local trucking service in Oregon and a through service to California points. Present schedules and service will be maintained or improved, Klein said, and acquisition of the line will make it possible to coordinate rail and truck shipments, providing greater flexibility of freight transportation for Oregon shippers.

Florist School to Be Held in August

Capt. L. C. Boldenweck announced yesterday that a florist school would be held here August 19th to 24th and that an attendance of 200 was anticipated. The school will run through the same dates of the South Lane County fair, but will not conflict. Both events are to be held at the Cottage Grove armory.

The school is expected to attract florists from all sections of the coast and as far east as Montana. Principal theme of the event will be teaching those in attendance how to make the various floral designs including corsages, wreaths, emblems, etc. Florists will also be told what plants are best adapted to the particular localities and taught the best methods of growing.

No charges or fees of any kind will be made, the school will be absolutely free. Representatives of the Oregon State college will appear on the program as well as some of the leading florists of the northwest. A display of machinery used by florists will be displayed by the manufacturers. It was said.

Inasmuch as the attendance is expected to tax accommodations, Capt. Boldenweck has asked those having extra rooms to list such rooms with him at his place of business at the West Main street bridge.
