

Outlaw Midgets to Provide Spills and Thrills at Fairgrounds Track the 27th

The International Racing association, a group of "outlaw" midget auto racing drivers rated as the most daring men in the nation on a dirt track, will provide Lane county sports followers with a thrill-packed evening's entertainment at the fairgrounds at Eugene next Saturday night. The drivers, along with their high-stepping miniature gas buggies, are being brought to Eugene by the Veterans of Foreign Wars in cooperation with Promotor Bobby Rowe.

While the meet will be the second of a series of six slated for the summer season, it will inaugurate night racing in Lane county. Time trials are slated to get under way at 7:30 o'clock with the first event on the eight-race program—the helmet dash—scheduled to start at 8:30 o'clock. The meet will be featured by a 30-lap main event.

Headlining the long list of drivers will be Les "Death Takes a Holiday" Anderson, brother of Bob Anderson who was seriously injured in a race at Vancouver, B. C., last Saturday night. The International association drivers are great showmen as well as daring pilots. The troupe tours the entire Pacific northwest, racing as far south as Medford and Klamath Falls, as far east as Boise, Idaho, and as far north as Vancouver, B. C.

H. C. Williamson O. S. C. Conference

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis. — H. C. Williamson, vocational agriculture teacher at the Cottage Grove high school, is one of 57 such teachers now attending a three-weeks conference for the entire state staff being held at Oregon State college as part of the summer session.

The group is carrying out a definite daily program of seminars and reading and conference periods in which they are working out latest procedures in organization and instructional work for their agricultural classes. Such problems as the organization of advanced courses in vocational agriculture, selection and use of agricultural teaching equipment, problems of administration, organization of farm mechanics work, as well as other items are on the list of conference topics.

A total of 52 high schools now have vocational agriculture classes with a total enrollment of 2,324. In this total registration, 2,120 are members of the Future Farmers of America chapters. In the Cottage Grove high school 57 are enrolled in the F.F.A. chapter.

In addition to his regular class work, Williamson has in the past year conducted an evening school in soil fertility and crop problems. Speaking at the annual vocational education banquet held during the conference, Frank L. Ballard, newly installed president of the college, praised the work of the agricultural teaching force and said that the best relationship exists between the vocational and extension work in agricultural in this state.

Utilities Faced With Increased Federal Taxes

The new federal tax increases on public utilities just inaugurated by the government to help pay for America's huge preparedness program will be absorbed by the Mountain States Power company, and will not be passed on to consumers, according to a statement made recently by Z. E. Merrill, its president.

"We appreciate," said Merrill, "that the United States cannot hope to raise billions for national security in a world at war unless all individuals and business organizations willingly make sacrifices, because the government is dependent upon taxes produced by personal initiative and private enterprise."

"Increases in federal taxes as of July 1, 1940, will amount to approximately \$26,000 annually and are of course in addition to very substantial increases in state, county, and other local taxes. It is estimated that the company's total federal tax alone for 1940 will be a quarter of a million dollars. Rates to customers will not be increased to provide funds for these tax increases, but will come out of money paid by customers at present rates, which means that it will leave a lesser amount for us for the payment of actual operating and other costs," he said. Mr. Merrill also pointed out that no publicly-owned utility pays any federal taxes.

Rites for Mrs. B. Sprong Monday

Rites for Mrs. Belle Sprong, aged 87, of Springfield, a resident of Mosby Creek for twenty-six years, were held at the Brumbaugh cemetery Monday afternoon, with the Rev. Lee of Sutherland officiating and the Mills chapel in charge of arrangements.

Mrs. Sprong died at her home in Springfield, Friday. She was born in Elkhart county, Indiana, September 16, 1853, and with the family later moved to Peoria, Illinois, and on to Guthrie Center, Iowa. The family crossed the plains by wagon train in 1866 and settled near Salem. Mrs. Sprong was married to William A. Sprong at Salem on December 25, 1881, and later in 1878 the couple moved to the Mosby Creek community where they resided until 1904 when the family moved to Springfield. Mr. Sprong passed away at Springfield in 1912. One daughter, Mrs. Minnie Morris of Springfield, and a number of grandchildren survive.

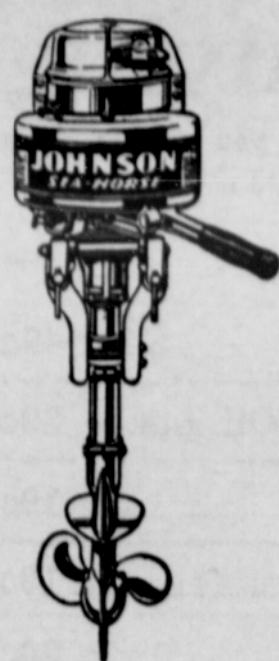
