

Persons Receiving FSA Chattles Are Liable Ct. Action

Persons selling, trading or receiving chattels mortgaged to the farm security administration as security for rehabilitation loans are liable to court action by the government if legal releases have not been secured, according to a notice received from the regional attorney, reports Dale R. Winn, county farm security administration supervisor, Eugene.

Restrictions are placed on sale or transfer of chattels mortgaged to Farm Security Administration not only to provide partial security for rehabilitation loans but to insure maintenance of sufficient operating goods to keep the farm on a productive basis and carry out farm plans, says the notice.

Where sale or trade of mortgaged chattels is necessary because of changes in farm operation, authorization for transfer of such property should be secured through the county supervisor's office, Winn pointed out.

News Briefs

Crop damage resulted from the heat wave which hit the middle west the first of the week. New seasonal temperatures were reached at many points. Corn was probably the heaviest damaged of all crops. Farther south and southwest the usual temperatures prevailed.

Professor Herbert C. Howe, 68 years of age, professor in the University of Oregon, died at the Walport community hospital Sunday after a ten weeks illness and funeral services were held in Eugene yesterday. He came to the University in 1901 as assistant professor of English literature and in 1903 was made head of the English literature department. During 1936 and 1937 he served as acting dean of college of arts and letters.

About 250 Lane county guardsmen will leave Sunday for training at Fort Lewis. Guardsmen will entrain from Eugene, Coquille, Albany and other points, but the training order does not include the local Battery which started the training period July 13th. Voluntary Training Naval Reserves Is Progressing Nicely

The program for the voluntary training of candidates for line officer commissions in the naval reserve is progressing satisfactorily. On July 10, 850 young men between the ages of 19 and 26, inclusive, with a minimum of two years' college education, had been enlisted in the Naval Reserve for this training. Of this number, 600 embarked in the USS Wyoming at New York on July 15 for a training cruise which will end at New York, August 10. During this cruise, stops will be made at Hampton Roads, Virginia, and at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

On satisfactory completion of this three months' training, reserve midshipmen will be given commissions as ensigns in the Naval Reserve and may be given an opportunity, if desired, to serve on active duty in the fleet with full pay and allowances.

The second training cruise in connection with this program will be made in three battleships during the period tentatively scheduled for August 19 to September 14. Approximately 1,200 men will be cruised during this period.

OIL COMPANIES ASSIST IN FIRE CAMPAIGN

SALEM — Oil companies and service station managers of Oregon are cooperating closely with the state forestry department in the campaign to prevent forest fires, Nelson S. Rogers, state forester, reports.

To further the cause, Richfield, Tidewater Associated and Union Oil of California have instructed their service station attendants to empty ash trays in the cars of all customers who stop for service of any kind. At the same time these attendants will call attention to the state law that imposes a \$75 fine for throwing cigarette stubs or any burning material from cars.

Other major and independent companies have given assurance they will cooperate along similar lines.

"Aside from the clear civic duty of every citizen to help prevent forest fires, we realize that Oregon's beautiful green forests attract much of the state's tourist trade and that means more sales for every business that serves the traveler in Oregon," said one oil company executive.
