Synthetic Wool From Milk

Two scientists of the U. S. department of agriculture have developed and patented a process for making fiber out of casein. The casein is softened in water and dissolved in a solution of caustic alkali. It becomes a thick sticky mass and in this condition is worked into the proper consistency by aging, by adding modifying agents, and by dilution. The mass is then forced through multiple spinnerets of the kind used in making rayon, and the fibers are separated and hardened in an acid bath containing formaldehyde and modifiers. The synthetic fiber thus produced has a chemical composition almost identical with wool, except for a lower sulphur content.

Covered Wagon, 1940

The world's biggest and costliest automobile—Admiral Byrd's snow cruiser with which he will explore hitherto inaccessible parts of the Antarctic continent—is a house on wheels. Fifty-five feet long, and 15 feet wide, it can carry a five-passenger airplane on its roof, while inside it has quarters for a crew of four men, an engine room, galley, cargo space, a store room and a control room. The giant machine, which has a cruising range of 6,000 miles, cost \$150,000 to build. In order to protect its crew from outside temperatures as low as 100 degrees below zero, it has been insulated with a four inch thick blanket of mineral wool.

Soldiers' Pension System

The soldiers' pension system is a development of comparatively recent times, although the personal pension—an award made on a special basis—was known even in the time of the Roman empire and was chiefly in the form of grants for military service. The number of such pensions was so large that Sully in the Sixteenth century included their reduction as a part of his plan for economy. The Plymouth Pilgrims had a regulation in 1636 providing for a pension for maimed soldiers.

Crop Output for 1940 Ample, Says Late OSC Report

Crop production in the United States this year promises to be fairly in line with probable requirements, in general, with a gross output only slightly under 1939, reports the O.S.C. extension service in its current review of the agricultural situation. Some decline occurred in the farm price level during recent weeks in the country as a whole, but the Oregon general farm price level was maintained, according to data in the report.

The principal variation in crop prospects from last year which is of particular significance to the farmers in Oregon is forage supplies. The hay crop of the country is expected to be very large—probably the largest production since 1927. Despite an increase of about 2 per cent in hay-consuming livestock, principally cattle and sheep, the hay crop will be large enough for liberal feeding in most areas with considerable carry-over next year.

The report contains detailed information regarding prospective production and farm prices on a large number of farm commodities, including wheat, feed grains, hay, seed crops, potatoes, truck crops, hops, beans, fruits and nuts, dairy products, chickens and eggs, and pig crop prospects.

The general level of farm prices at mid-June in the country as a whole, was 95 per cent of the 1910-1914 level, compared with 123 as the index of prices paid by farmers for commodities. Considering interest, taxes, and wages for farm labor in addition, farm costs were approximately 128 per cent of the pre-war average. The Oregon index of prices received by farmers was 70 per cent of the 1926-1930 level, compared with 67 for the country as a whole.

With the volume of production of all crops combined expected to be nearly the same as in 1939, the report points out that gross production in 1939 was the same as in 1938 and just equal to the average from 1924 to 1929. However, the increase in all livestock and livestock products in 1939 was 6 per cent over 1938 and 13 per cent over the 1924-1929 average. Animal production in 1940 is expected to show an increase in cattle and sheep but some decrease in hogs and poultry. Copies of the report are available from county agents or direct from the college.
