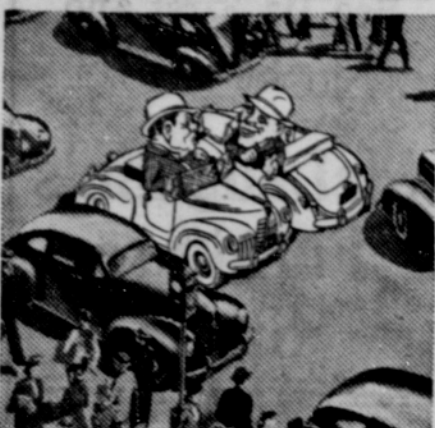

Committee Urges Careful Selection Of Farm Products

One of the outstanding weaknesses of most local fairs is usually the poor selection of products by the exhibitor. Too often unusually large individuals are selected for exhibiting regardless of shape or condition. Often disappointment is expressed by the exhibitor of very large products because of failure to receive a place in a class.

In each class of products there are certain points that a judge looks for in making his placings. For most products these are: uniformity of lot, freedom from diseases, insect injury or scars; shape; and color (as required by variety). The following are some of the requirements of good farm product displays:

APPLES AND PEARS: Pick out five individuals of the same size and shape (consider requirements of variety), well colored, uniform or alike, and free from worm injury or other blemishes. All individuals should be solid and have normal stems attached.

PRUNES AND PLUMS: Pick out enough for a convenient plateful. Bear in mind the points mentioned above with particular attention to color and condition of fruit. Stems should be left intact on all fruit.

PUMPKINS, SQUASH, MELONS AND CUCUMBERS: Pick out well shaped individuals that are firm, in good condition and free from blemishes. Be sure the color and size is typical of the variety and avoid selecting individuals because they are unusually large. Where more than one individual is displayed, be careful to select for uniformity in size and shape.

ROOT VEGETABLES: The same requirements of uniformity, shape and size hold true here. Use five individuals in each display, picking those that have healthy tops that are fresh and crisp and above all see that the exhibit is thoroughly washed with cold water.

POTATOES: In selecting potatoes, freedom from injury, smoothness and uniformity are important points to consider. Individuals should weigh between five and eight ounces each and should be shaped according to the variety.

CORN EARS: Ears should be uniform and between seven and nine inches long. They should be tapered slightly, butts should be hollow, rows straight and tips uniformly covered.

GRAINS AND FIELD SEEDS: Grains and other field seeds should be plump, uniform, free from foreign material as other grain seed, weed seed or chaff, and free from disease or mechanical injury. Heavy weight per bushel, bright color and freedom from smut odor or stains are other important considerations.

In showing all types of farm products, the ability of the exhibitor to select the best individuals is an important factor. Studying over possible material for exhibiting considerable time before the fair is a helpful procedure to follow.

S. P. ANNOUNCES COACH FARE CUT

Sweeping reductions in one-way and roundtrip coach fares between southern Oregon and S. P. main-line points in northern Oregon will become effective August 10, according to announcement by J. A. Ormandy, general passenger agent, Portland.

The new fares will be the lowest every-day fares on sale for many years, Ormandy said. Round trips will carry a return limit of 30 days. To illustrate the sharp reductions which will be made Ormandy said the one-way coach fare between Cottage Grove and Portland will be reduced to \$2.65 and the roundtrip to \$4.60 with proportionately low fares to other points.

Heart Attack Fatal To Olof T. Olsen

A heart attack was fatal to Olof T. Olsen, 61, Saturday evening, found dead at his home at 55 South River Road Sunday evening. Mr. Olsen had been in ill health for sometime. When neighbors saw no signs of activity around his home an investigation was conducted. According to reports, he was found dead in bed by Mrs. W. A. Heck about 6:45 Sunday evening. Death is believed to have occurred about twenty-four hours earlier. He was alone at the time of his death.

Mr. Olsen had lived here for the past ten years, coming from Seaside. He had been employed at local mills until an injury forced him to retire. He was born at Chicago, December 18, 1878, where he lived until his removal to Oregon twenty-eight years ago. He first settled at Seaside, where his wife, Mrs. Olsen, passed away nineteen years ago.

Surviving are eight daughters and one son. Surviving daughters are: Marie Olsen, Mrs. E. P. Nelson, Angeline Olsen, all of Ocean Park, Washington; Mrs. Mildred O'Brien of Reno, Nevada; June Olsen, Seaside; Mrs. E. C. Kelly, Portland; Mrs. C. A. Wells, Odin, Illinois; and Evelyn Olsen of Cottage Grove, and a son, Russell Olsen of Ocean Park, Washington.

Funeral services were held at the Smith Chapel yesterday morning at 10:00 o'clock with the Rev. Gordon Hynes, Christian minister, officiating. Interment was made in the Seaside cemetery.

Also surviving are one brother, Anton Olsen, Iron River, Michigan; two sisters, Mrs. Bertha Johnson, Iron River, Michigan, and Mrs. Julia Keckhefer of Chicago, Illinois, and four grandchildren.
