NYA TRAINING OPEN

PORTLAND — Boys and girls in Lane county who seek employment on NYA may now apply for assignment to the resident work-experience project at Weiser, Idaho, according to an announcement here by Ivan G. Munro, state NYA administrator.

The Weiser project, operated on a regional basis, has an enrollment of 325 young men and 75 young women. Oregon's quota is 110 youths, of whom about 65 have already been selected, Munro said.

Each youth enrolls for a period of at least 12 months, it was announced, and the young people register for vocational training courses in occupations of their own choosing.

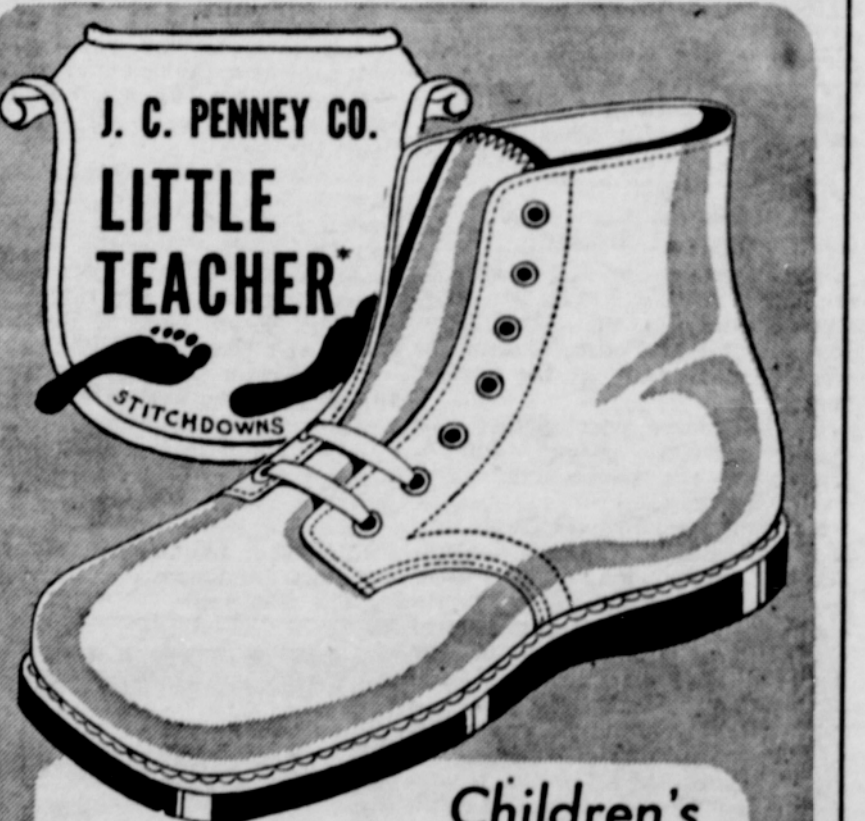
