

Commission Hopes To Prevent Fires During Elk Season

All steps possible to prevent outbreak of any fires during the Clatsop county elk season are being taken by State Game Commission officials.

With the cooperation of the State Forestry department, arrangements have been made for the establishment of at least eight "hot" camps—where camp fires may be built—and only cold camps will be permitted elsewhere in the hunting area.

The Clatsop county bull elk season opens at noon on August 24 and ends on September 2. Shooting of cow elk will not be permitted in Clatsop county and any hunter killing cow elk will face vigorous prosecution.

If a hunter is unable to bag a bull elk in Clatsop county, his bull elk tag will be good in northeastern Oregon during the elk season there, November 1 to 16, inclusive.

Seven checking stations will be operated by the Game Commission and commission trucks will be operated in the Saddle Mountain and Wickiup sections to carry hunters in and out of the hunting districts.

Checking stations for Clatsop county elk season will be in the following locations: Astoria, State Highway Patrol headquarters; Seaside, city hall; Wolf Creek Highway Junction; Elsie, Oney's Tavern; Jewell, back room of Jewell store (a new station); Birkenfeld, Shell Garage and Clatskanie Hotel.

"Hot" camps where camp fires will be permitted will be established in the following locations: Beneke creek (hunters may drive to camp); Young's river camp, N. W. of Saddle Mountain (hunters may drive to this camp via Young's river road); Lewis and Clark camp, S. W. of Saddle Mountain; Eastern and Western Logging company camp, S. E. of Saddle Mountain and in the Wickiup area two camps will be set up on the California barrel road and two camps on the Cooperage road.

Game commission trucks will operate as follows: In the Saddle Mountain area, one truck from Jewell-Astoria highway to Young's river and Lewis and Clark camps; one pickup from Jewell-Astoria highway to Eastern - Western camp.

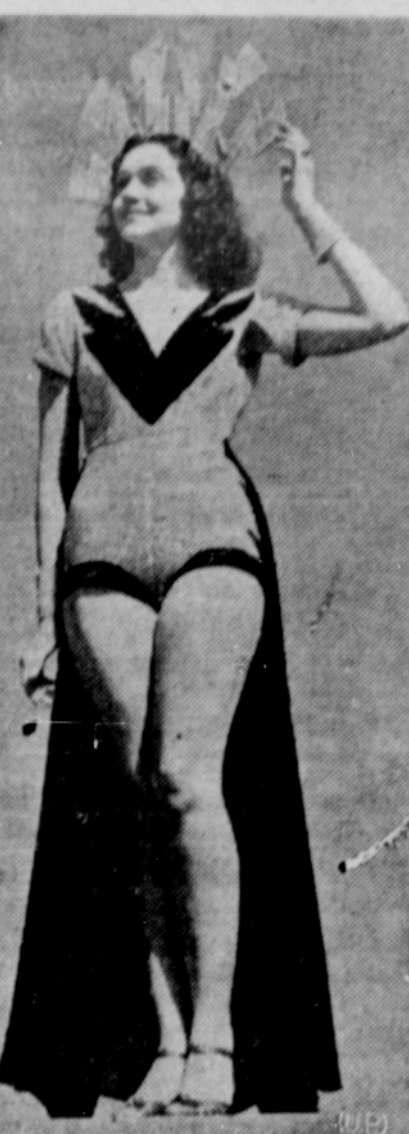
In the Wickiup district one truck will operate from Jewell-Astoria highway on the Cooperage road and one truck on the California barrel road.

HUNTERS MUST OBSERVE RULES

Hunters seeking to bag bull elk in Clatsop County this season will be required to camp at designated sites and will be subject to draft for fighting forest fires that may start in the area, according to a bulletin just issued by N. S. Rogers, state forester.

These regulations are the result of a plan worked out by the forestry department, the game commission, the N. W. Oregon Forest Protective association and the owners of timber lands in the area, the Crossett Western Company and the Crown-Zellerbach Company. Objectives of the plan are to keep a close check on hunters and reduce fire hazards to a minimum during the Clatsop County open season on bull elk, from August 14 to September 2.

Duck Hunting Season Extended 15 Days in Coming Open Season

WASHINGTON—Duck hunters will have 15 more days of sport this fall, but sportsmen who go after woodcock, geese and doves will have to watch their step.

Secretary of the Interior Ickes Tuesday announced a 60-day season on duck, after the enforcement of a 45-day limit for the last five years. But shorter seasons for woodcock hunting, and smaller bag limits on geese and doves, also were announced.

Woodcock hunting season was reduced to 15 days; the bag limit on geese to 3 a day, and on doves to 12. The bag limit on ducks remains at 10, except for canvasbacks, redheads, buffleheads and ruddy ducks, which remains at 3.

The duck hunting season in Oregon, Washington, California, Idaho, Utah and Nevada, all of which states are in the intermediate zone, will be from October 16 to December 14. Shooting hours on waterfowl and coot will be from sunrise to 4:00 p. m., instead of from 7:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m.
