

News Briefs

Leon Trotsky, one of the original architects of the Soviet Union and founder of its red army, died last night in Mexico City, stricken down by an assailant he described on his death bed as an agent of Stalin. Trotsky, aged 63, man without a country, was mortally wounded by a supposed friend when he was struck at the base of the skull with a pick.

Big guns of Germany, located across the English channel, this morning were bombarding England and an English convoy. Big guns were sending shells over at the rate of one each thirty seconds.

OUTSTANDING DAIRY HEIFER SECURED BY F.F.A. BOY

Clifford Van Prooyen, agricultural student and high school junior, has just purchased a heifer from an exceptionally high producing Jersey cow. The cow, which is owned by Dick Reed of the Chula Vista dairy, produced 596 pounds of butterfat in a 305 day record last year. According to an investigation made by O.S.C. in 1929, the average butterfat yield per cow per year in the Willamette valley was 270 pounds. This heifer is three weeks old and will be an addition to Van Prooyen's agricultural home project.

Besides this heifer, Clifford has a registered Chester White sow and 11 pigs, 2 acres of corn and a Jersey cow for his project. Some registered sheep will also be added to the project this fall. The Van Prooyen farm is in the Lynx Hollow district.
