

Nut Production One-tenth Less

The combined production of the four major tree nuts, walnuts, filberts, almonds and pecans, in the United States this year is estimated to be about 10 per cent smaller than in 1939 and about 15 per cent above the ten-year average. Smaller crops of walnuts, filberts and almonds are indicated, while pecans show an increase.

The three Pacific coast states will have approximately 51,800 tons of walnuts, according to the latest official forecast, or 13 per cent less than the 59,400 tons harvested last year.

The Oregon and Washington crop is expected to be about 4800 tons, or 9 per cent more than last season. During July there was some damage from blight, but aside from that orchards are generally in good condition. The California crop is placed at 47,000 tons, 13 per cent less than in 1939.

Prospective filbert production in the northwest is 7 per cent under that of last season. The Oregon crop is estimated at 2810 tons, or 11 per cent under last year's, and the Washington crop is placed at 690 tons, or 17 per cent more than a year ago.

Practically all the almonds are produced in California and the crop is expected to be 10,800 tons as against 19,200 tons a year ago and 12,270 tons average.

The total United States production of pecans is figured at 36,840 tons compared with 31,820 tons last year. About 25 per cent of the crop will consist of improved varieties.

State's Population Gains Fourteen Percent Over 1930

WASHINGTON—A 14 per cent population increase was reported Monday in Oregon by the census bureau bringing the total to 1,087,717.

The state's 133,931 gain in the last decade was spread over nearly all its counties. However, the changes ranged from a decrease of 21.8 per cent in Sherman county to an increase of 75.3 per cent in Malheur county.

Changes in Oregon's cities of 10,000 or more population varied from a decrease of 2.4 per cent in Astoria to an increase of 17.2 per cent in Salem. Portland, largest city in the state with a count of 307,572 was 1.9 per cent larger than in 1930.

CANADA TO HAVE WHEAT PROCESSING TAX; LOANS

The Canadian government has just adopted a processing tax on wheat similar to that formerly used in this country, and has also adopted a wheat loan program somewhat comparable to the one in force here. A processing tax of 15 cents a bushel will be collected on all wheat used for flour or other products for human consumption, but will not apply to wheat or wheat products sold for export, according to word received by the O. S. C. extension service.

The amount collected will be used by the Canadian wheat board to supplement its funds available for the wheat program. The wheat loan plan will be used to encourage the holding of wheat on farms, as Canada is faced with insufficient elevator storage to handle this year's crop. The 1940 crop is estimated at between 350 and 400 million bushels, while elevator storage is available for only about 160 million bushels in view of the heavy hold-over from last year.
