

Fall Checkup Of Tires Urged By Local Dealer

Nine-Day Buying Event Is

Treads For Wet Roads

Besides this, new tire treads are sharp and clean-cut, providing necessary protection against skidding on wet pavements prevalent in Autumn.

Pear Standards of Naval Applicants State Are Changed Exceeds the Quota

Revisions in Oregon standards for winter pears: U. S. Extra No. 1 or Oregon extra fancy; U. S. No. 1; U. S. No. 2 or Oregon fancy; U. S. Combination grade; Oregon commercial; and Oregon unclassified. This doubles the number of grades formerly in use. The commercial grade is a combination of extra fancy and fancy, or which 50 per cent must meet the requirements of Oregon extra fancy. The U. S. combination is half U. S. No. 1 and half U. S. No. 2 pears.

The Oregon standards for summer and fall pears include four grades, extra fancy, fancy, unclassified and combination grades, or the U. S. standards for these pears may be used as optional grades. The latter are U. S. No. 1, U. S. No. 2, U. S. combination and unclassified. The unclassified grade is a designation to show that no definite grade has been applied to the lot.

Besides setting up requirements for each grade, a variety of other matters incident to the marketing and sale of pears is covered in the two sets of standards.

Rogue River Train Changes Schedule

South-bound schedule of The Rogue River, overnight passenger train which operates nightly serving points between Portland and Ashland, will be shortened 50 minutes, effective September 1, according to advice received at local Southern Pacific offices today from J. A. Ormandy, general passenger agent, Portland.

The train will continue to depart from Portland at 7:15 p. m. as at present, but will leave Cottage Grove at 12:16 a. m. instead of 1:06 a. m. and will arrive in Ashland at 8:15 a. m. instead of 9:05 a. m. The northbound schedule will be unchanged.
