Lumber Defense Committee Set Up

SEATTLE, Washington. — Formation of a "Lumber and Timber Products Defense Committee" in Washington, D. C., by forest industry and representatives from Oregon, Washington and other major lumber producing regions, was announced recently by the West Coast Lumbermen's association, Seattle. The committee was formed, the announcement said, at the request of the National Defense Advisory Commission.

"This is the first such industrial committee created to cooperate in national defense," association officials stated. "John W. Watzek Jr., in charge of the lumber section of the national defense commission's industrial materials division, has asked the committee to deal with the problems of unifying grades and specifications; to gather and maintain current information on available stocks of lumber and timber products; to transmit information from the government to industry, and vice versa, on prospective needs for lumber, and means of rapid and adequate supply; and to stand by for action on any other lumber factor of the national defense program."
