Simple Meals for Summer Weather

'Simple meals have more appeal during the summer' should be welcome news for the homemaker for planning and serving this type of meal will give her more free hours for a vacation right at home. We all like trying to fool the weather man with refreshing chilled dishes, crisp salads, iced beverages, and frozen desserts—all of which can be prepared ahead of time and are good to pep up lagging summer appetites.

But even with this desire for chilled foods, it is a good plan to serve at least one hot dish—yes, even when the mercury soars. This hot dish should be one easy to prepare and creamed dishes come into their own here. Creamed dishes offer much variety in the summer menu for any leftover bits of meat, fish, or vegetable may be used in them. They are a good way, too, to keep the milk quota up and this is important in hot weather. Buttered toast, rice or noodle rings, waffles, or patty shells can be used under the creamed food and, to garnish with an extra bit of good value, use grated cheese.

Use fruits generously during the summer—in fruit cups, in salads, and for dessert. They need little or no preparation and round out the food value of the day's meals. Use fruit sliced and served with cream for dessert or use it in one of your summer specialties.

Creamed Shrimp and Peas

5 tbsp butter
5 tbsp flour
2 cups milk
1 tsp salt
Speck pepper
Dash cayenne
3 tbsp lemon juice
10 tbsp mayonnaise
2 cups canned or fresh cooked shrimp
1 cup fresh cooked peas
Waffles.

Melt the butter in a double boiler. Remove from heat; add flour and stir until well blended. Add the milk; place over boiling water, and cook, stirring constantly until thick. Add the salt, pepper, cayenne, lemon juice, and mayonnaise. Blend thoroughly. Add the shrimp and peas and heat well. Serve on waffles. Serves 6.

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
