

AAA Committees Preparing the 1941 Program Guides

With the 1941 AAA farm program providing more leeway than ever before for county and state variations to meet local conditions, the state committee for Oregon is now preparing the new handbook and other details for putting the program in effect in this state.

Oregon is one of the few, if not the only state, to have the same farmer personnel on the state committee since its organization in 1936. The only change has been the promotion of the first chairman, N. E. Dodd, to the position of western regional director. Other farmer members then and now are Will Steen, Milton, chairman the past two years; John Shepard, Scio; William Enschede, Hillsboro, and Robert Weir, Lakeview.

Final details of the 1941 program, announced late in August, follow closely the recommendations of farmer committeemen at a national conference earlier in the summer, says N. C. Donaldson, Oregon executive officer. Both the agricultural conservation and range programs follow the same general lines as those of 1939 and 1940.

Provision is made for continuing the combined range and agricultural conservation in any area approved by the state committee.

Payment for natural reseeded by deferred grazing and supplemental practices is increased from 75 per cent to 100 per cent of the range-building allowance, to permit ranchmen to carry out to a greater extent practices best adapted to their land. Maximum payment for deferred grazing without supplementary practices is also increased somewhat.

Three provisions which may be applied in individual counties to obtain greater conservation are included in the 1941 program. These may be used in lieu of total soil-depleting acreage allotments in areas where feed crops are not generally grown for market and where greater conservation can be obtained under the alternate provisions.

Old Age Pensioners Owners of Property County Court Says

Old age pensioners of Lane county will again become owners of their property according to a decision handed down by the county court in Eugene yesterday. The county court late Tuesday entered an order deeding back to the pension recipients their homes or lands acquired by the county when the pensions were granted. The property is placed on the tax roll and owners will be compelled to pay all taxes. In addition the amount the pensioner receives henceforth will be a lien upon the premises.

Tuesday's court order makes provisions for restoring property to twenty pensioners. At the death of the pensioner the welfare commission is permitted to file a claim against the estate for the amount of money received as a pension.

64th FIELD ARTILLERY BIVOUACS HERE

41ST DIVISION TO BE MOBILIZED

Mobilization of the entire 41st division, consisting of national guardsmen in five northwest states, for 12 months intensive training will be ordered "within three weeks" Major General George A. White predicted authoritatively at Portland Saturday.

Return to Fort Lewis, Washington, cantonments will occur by mid September, the general said. He explained he was "basing this announcement on my knowledge of plans as well as on congressional action Friday, giving the president authority to mobilize the guard."

The call will bring 10,000 guardsmen into the field who are now returning to home stations in Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming after summer maneuvers. General White said the division will be expanded immediately by 3,000 men and within the year by 7,000 additional recruits, to bring a total strength of 20,000 men.

The encampment will include the 116 observation squadron, Spokane, and the 91st observation squadron, McChord Field, Tacoma.

The registration of out-of-state motor vehicles for the first seven months of the year has shown an alarming decrease, totaling 10,318 cars or 14.4%—yet, the consumption of gasoline in the state during this period has jumped! In the month of June alone consumption was more than 26,000,000 gallons—a gain of nearly 25% over record-breaking 1939. The gain for the first six months was 10.5%.

The only explanation that Secretary of State Earl Snell can offer for this seeming paradox is increased intra-state travel. Undoubtedly the Motorlogs have done much to stimulate this home-travel of Oregon people, and your paper is entitled to due credit for its participation.

Stolen Car Abandoned At Roseburg Found Thru Tip of Local Boy

Through efforts of Herman Abbott, about 20, who lives two miles north of here, a car stolen in Eugene last Thursday afternoon was recovered. The car, a 1937 Chevrolet sedan, belonging to Brooks Perry of route 4, Eugene, stolen from in front of the Eugene cannery, was recovered the following morning, abandoned at Roseburg.

A young boy, about 16, driving south passed the Abbott farm and asked young Abbott to ride with him. Abbott rode into town Thursday evening and reported to Guy Smith, night officer. He told Officer Smith he believed the car was stolen because the driver acted too nervous and gave Smith the description of the car. When a state patrolman came through later in the evening, Smith gave the state officer a description of the car and the description was telephoned into Eugene, where it was broadcast.

A lock on the gas tank probably caused the young driver to abandon the car. Officers reported he evidently attempted to take the gas cap off at Yoncalla, but did not succeed. So far, however, he has managed to escape apprehension.

Progress on the New Highway Satisfactory

Satisfactory progress is being made on the construction of the .85 of a mile of new highway through the south part of town. Concrete work on the main roadbed will be finished within the next ten days. Three six-foot concrete strips have been laid practically the entire length of the road and another will probably be finished before the close of the week.

Building curb and guttering will not go so rapidly as fewer men can work at the job. This will be finished and ready for use within four or five weeks.

COUNTY MAKES GOOD USE OF LIBRARY

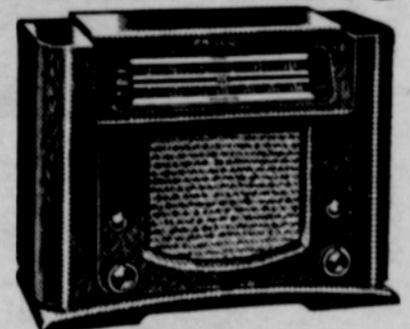
Lane county residents made good use of the state library, according to figures released in the biennial report of Harriet C. Long, state librarian. During the two-year period ending on June 30, 1940, the mail order service was used by 1,381 rural residents, who were reached through Lane county's 58 post offices. Traveling libraries were found in 75 communities, in each of which some one person gave his or her services to act as volunteer librarian in order that others in the neighborhood might enjoy the state's book service. Public libraries in Lane county borrowed 7,765 volumes during this time.
