Nelson Receives Commission Local Postmaster Tues.

Turkey Crop Declines In Growing Sections

There are fewer turkeys on foot this year to grace the tables in the holiday season. Various estimates say the turkey crop on the Pacific coast is about forty-five percent less than last year, the comparative percentage is less in the Willamette valley and south through the turkey district. Around here the crop is approximately thirty-five percent smaller than last year. In Texas where a large portion of the nation's crop is grown, the decrease in the crop amounts to about ten percent.

The turkey meat in cold storage, carried over from last year, and the market last year was a big factor in a smaller crop.
