The act authorizes the expenditure of \$327,000,000 for much-needed highway construction throughout the 48 states for the fiscal years 1942 and 1943. Oregon's share will approximate \$2,149,000 for each of the two fiscal years.

Union Hi School Staging Drive for Shrubbery, Plants

The Cottage Grove union high school students are staging a drive for shrubbery and plants for landscaping the 19½ acre campus on the hill south of town. The Future Farmers of America under the direction of Henry Williamson have plotted the area and laid out a landscaping scheme.

Donations of shrubs and plants of almost any kind will be acceptable. Members of the F.F.A. will gladly call at the residences of those parties who have shrubs they wish to have taken up and placed on the school grounds.

The school authorities suggest that the high school office be notified of donations during the next month.

A large area along the walks in front of the building has been prepared for a rock garden, and any gifts of rock garden plants will be especially appreciated.

Among the shrubs desired are the following: 2 deodora, 4 alemi cypress, 6 spirea thunbergii, 2 Virginia juniper, 2 Engelmann's ivy, 4 Boston ivy, 61 contoneaster horizontalis (creeping), 18 English laurel, 25 Portugal laurel, 39 lauristinas, 5 pyracantha or firethorn, 5 golden privet, 10 spirea Van Houttei, 16 abelia, 15 contoneaster simonsii (medium size), 4 retinospora, 21 acuba (Japanese laurel), 12 bush honeysuckle (Japanese), about 3500 St. Johnwort (hypericum rubens), 350 phlox subulata, 500 English ivy plants.

Livestock Market Airmen Approve Plans for Building Hangar at Airport

The livestock market at the Portland Union Stock Yards, North Portland, for the week ended September 28th, was mostly steady for good grain-fed cattle, with grass steers showing weakness. Cows and heifers were generally 25c higher, with weakness toward the close. The hog market opened around 15c lower than the previous week, with more strength shown during the week on the basis of \$6.75 for good to choice 170 to 215 lb. truckins. The good demand in the sheep alleys made a very active market on a 25c a cwt. higher basis for fat lambs. Most sales of good to choice trucked in spring lambs were from \$8.25 to \$8.50, with some carlots up to \$8.65, for a new high since last June. Feeder lambs also sold actively at steady prices around \$7.00 to \$7.50 for light feeders, and some fleshy kinds up to \$8.00 to shearer buyers. There were 2,900 cattle, 275 calves, 4,400 hogs and 3,875 sheep sold on the open market during the past week.

This week's trading opened Monday with 2,550 cattle, 200 calves, 2,400 hogs and 1,500 sheep for sale on the open market.

Monday's cattle prices ranged generally from steady to 25c lower. A part load of good to choice lightweight steers, grain-fed, sold at \$11, with several loads from \$10 to \$10.60. Most of the fat grass steers sold from \$8.00 to \$8.75, with a few loads and odd lots at \$9.00 to \$9.25. Stocker steers sold mainly \$7.00 to \$8.00. A few grass heifers made \$8.50 early, with common to medium kinds selling \$5.75 to \$8.00, good to choice grain fed heifers topped at \$10.00. Fat dairy type cows ranged up to \$5.50, with good beef cows around \$6.50 to \$7.25. Medium to good bulls were mainly \$6.50 to \$7.25. Vealer calves made a new practical top of \$12.00.

Tuesday's cattle sales were generally on a comparative basis with Monday's prices, with offerings mostly limited to the lower grades.

The opening hog market, compared with the previous week, was 25c lower on carlot trading. Most carlots topped at \$6.60, and good to choice 170 to 215 lb. truck-ins sold mainly at \$6.40, with a few sales up to \$6.50.

Tuesday's truck-in offerings sold in line with prices established in Monday's trading.

The sheep market opened this week active and steady to strong. Good to choice trucked in lambs sold \$8.25 to \$8.50, with the major portion at the latter price. Shorn lambs were around \$7.65 to \$7.75. The demand was good for feeder lambs at prices mainly \$7.00 to \$7.50. Good slaughter ewes were \$3.00 to \$3.50.

A good demand was evidenced in Tuesday's sheep trading at steady prices.

The following quotations are based on prices being paid in Tuesday's trading:

CATTLE: Good grain-fed steers \$10.00 to \$11.00. Good grass steers \$8.25 to \$9.25. Good grain-fed heifers \$9.00 to \$10.00. Good grass heifers \$7.50 to \$8.50. Good beef cows \$6.50 to \$7.50, medium \$5.75 to \$6.75, common \$4.75 to \$5.50, canners \$3.25 to \$4.00. Bulls, medium to good \$6.50 to \$7.25, common \$5.50 to \$6.25. Vealers, good to choice, \$11.00 to \$12.00.

HOGS: Good to choice carlots \$6.60; 170 to 215 lb. truckins \$6.25 to \$6.40; 230 to 285 lb. butchers \$5.50 to \$6.00; lightweight butchers \$5.50 to \$5.85; packing sows \$4.25 to \$5.00. Feeder pigs \$5.25 to \$6.00.

SHEEP: Good to choice lambs \$8.25 to \$8.50; medium to good, \$7.50 to \$8.00; common \$6.50 to \$7.00. Slaughter ewes, good to choice \$3.00 to \$3.50. Feeder lambs, good to choice, \$7.00 to \$7.50. Shorn lambs \$7.65 to \$7.75.

The Cottage Grove Flying club Monday evening approved plans to build a hangar immediately on the airport site about two miles south on the VanNortwick farm and also voted to develop the airport site which will be operated under lease. Definite information on the size of the hangar is not available at this time, but plans will likely be drawn for a one or two plane hangar.

Club members also discussed the purchase of a plane, which was ordered sometime ago. It was announced the plane now in Cincinnati, Ohio, was ready for delivery, but decision was reached to defer the delivery of the plane until a later date.

In the meantime arrangements have been made to use the plane ordered by C. E. Roberts and other club members and until the Roberts plane is delivered, which will likely be shortly, the club will have available a plane from Eugene, which will be for club member use only on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Sundays of each week.

Further improvements of the airport will likely be held in abeyance, pending the approval of the civil aeronautics authority.

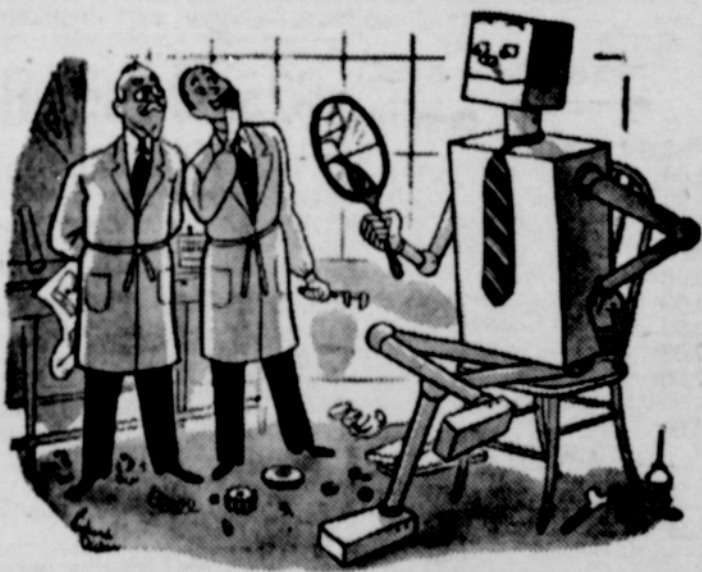
