Flying Squadron Hunt Game Law Violators in Area

A special flying squad of law enforcement officers in plain clothes and an airplane to spot violators are being used to augment the regular force of state police during the present hunting season.

The men who have been selected from the field personnel of the Oregon State Game commission are working directly under Frank B. Wire, state game supervisor, and will be shifted throughout the state, perhaps working one week in one section and the next in another.

The airplane will carry an officer in addition to the pilot who will be equipped with a two-way radio set.

If poachers shooting pheasants are spotted, the officer in the plane will communicate location of such violators to officers in automobiles on the road.

"The aim of the game commission is to prevent law violations," said Mr. Wire. "More effective patrol work can be done, we believe, through officers working in the same type of clothes worn by the hunters. Many of the regular state officers are working in plain clothes this year, too."

MORE STUDENTS SET NEW RECORD AT OREGON STATE

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—A heavy influx of new students, particularly women, has brought a 2 per cent increase in fall term registration at Oregon State college, which will reach a new record term total of about 4700 when the late registration is completed.

An 11 per cent increase in new students was shown, with 1862 enrolled at the end of the first week compared with 1,682 at the corresponding time a year ago. Old students were off slightly, with a total of 2,664 compared to 2,746 last year.

PUD Rejected by Big Majority December 8, 1939

LANE VOTERS FACE QUESTION AGAIN NOV. 5—MINORITY GROUP FORCE INCLUSION ON BALLOT

Despite the fact that only a few short months ago the voters of Lane County turned thumbs down on the PUD question, a minority group has managed to bring the question up again for the general election this fall. . . November 5th.

Not Question of Rates

No, the PUD'ers have nothing to say about rates. They cannot guarantee lower rates in Lane County than are now provided through the Mountain States Power Company whose rates are approved by regulatory bodies. Moreover, if a PUD should ever be voted in, it becomes a law unto itself insofar as rates are concerned. It does not answer to any governing body, either state or federal utilities commission, on any question concerning rates.

PUD Has Taxing Power

Under the PUD proposal, if carried, an issue of general obligation bonds totaling as much as \$1,688,000.00 is permitted, and should the revenue of the proposed district fail to pay operating and maintenance cost plus principal and interest payments on the bonds, the directors may LEVY A TAX UPON ALL PROPERTY WITHIN THE DISTRICT to pay authorized bonds and interest thereon.

It is not surprising that time after time the attempts to "put over" a PUD have failed in various counties throughout this state. The American people are not ready for regimentation yet by a long way.
