Around the World

In 1938 the world produced 1,978,340,000 barrels of petroleum; the United States produced 1,213,254,000,000 barrels or 61%. The United States consumed 21,812,784,000 gallons of gasoline for that year. If this amount had to be dispensed from a single modern pump capable of delivering 10 gallons a minute, it would require 3,808 years, working 24 hours a day, to fill the need. I am told that Sir Isaac Newton, Jonathan Swift, Dostoevski, Turgenew, Tolstol, Strindberg, Edgar Allen Poe, Goethe, Byron, Hans Christian Anderson, Balzac, Napoleon, Beethoven, Michelangelo and William Cowper were men of the highest type of genius who had psychotic strains or manic depressive symptoms. Very often great men are looked upon by their friends as "teased in the head," and are pitied for their weaknesses, though honored for their greatness. But who does not have weaknesses?

No more gold or silver is to be used (as of June, 1940) in making badges of rank in the German military forces—the idea is to effect a saving in these metals which are so scarce in Germany.

The finest products of the steel industry are coil springs which weigh only 12,000,000ths of a pound each. These are used in making necklace clasps.

Quicksilver, besides being used to trap gold in the mining industry, is used in making the dye and paints; felt for hats and linings for automobile bodies; amalgam in dentistry; and blasting caps both for industrial work and war needs, without which not a shot could be fired.

The first income taxes were introduced in England during 1799 as a temporary measure. They were not regarded as a permanent source of income until 1842.

BUSINESS

Aircraft production is "keeping pace" in the defense program, says Commissioner William Knudsen after inspecting plants of Pratt and Whitney and Wright Aeronautical—they turned out almost 1,400 motors in September, exceeding expectations. . . . Averages of private crop estimates as of October 1 indicate "little change" occurred in condition of major crops during September. . . . American makers of household refrigerators this year had the best August in the industry's history, with sales double those for the same month of 1939—this in spite of the fact foreign sales, except for Canada, have steadily fallen behind last year, which in turn was poorer than 1938. . . . Volume of modernization and repair work on homes will be materially larger this year than for some time, with loans for such, under FHA, being 12 per cent higher for the third quarter than for any similar period since FHA was launched—and ordinarily it's the final quarter of a year that sees the largest volume of this work done.

INFORMATION GIVEN FOR CIDER MAKERS

With the cider season at hand, the state department of agriculture has received varied requests dealing with the manufacture and sale of this product.

Manufacture of cider for sale requires the same sanitary conditions as for any food product. Apples used must, of course, be clean and must meet the tolerance on spray residue. This latter is 0.05 grain of lead per pound and 0.025 grain of arsenic per pound.

The individual or apple grower who manufactures cider for market must comply with the law which requires that any food product manufactured state the product and whether or not any preservative has been added. Also, the label should contain the name and address of the manufacturer and net weight of contents.

Dougherty, assistant professor of veterinary medicine, after extensive research into this ancient malady conducted at the Oregon experiment station. Dr. Dougherty recently reported his findings to the American Veterinary Medical association at its national convention in Washington, D. C.
