

O.S.C. Man to Get Outlook Reports For Ore. Farmers

L. R. Breithaupt, extension agricultural economist in charge of statistics, market news, and outlook work at Oregon State college, has gone to Washington to attend the annual national agricultural outlook conference, held there October 21 through October 26. The conference is made up of specialists from each state plus men from the federal bureau of agricultural economics who are acquainted with the trends in the various agricultural enterprises throughout the world.

Dr. Eric Englund, assistant chief of the bureau of agricultural economics and a graduate of Oregon State college, is in charge of this year's conference program. It has been arranged to emphasize consideration of imports and probable effects of the war upon the farming industry. Problems of agricultural adjustment to meet the domestic and world conditions indicated by the outlook will be considered.

Major attention this year will be directed toward the situation for the principal farm products such as cotton, wheat, tobacco, fruit, meat animals, and dairy products. Responsibility for developing outlook information on specialty farm products will fall largely upon state agricultural college outlook specialists. This is particularly the case in Oregon where the production of specialty crops and animal products is an important factor in the annual agricultural production.

The information obtained at the Washington conference by Professor Breithaupt will be prepared for general use in Oregon following his return. County agricultural agents will make the outlook information available locally in every county of the state to aid farmers in planning their production as much as possible in accordance with the outlook ahead.

This procedure has been carried on in Oregon and throughout the country for more than 10 years, and is credited with being an important factor in adjusting production to market needs and thus preventing serious losses to growers by unnecessary market gluts.

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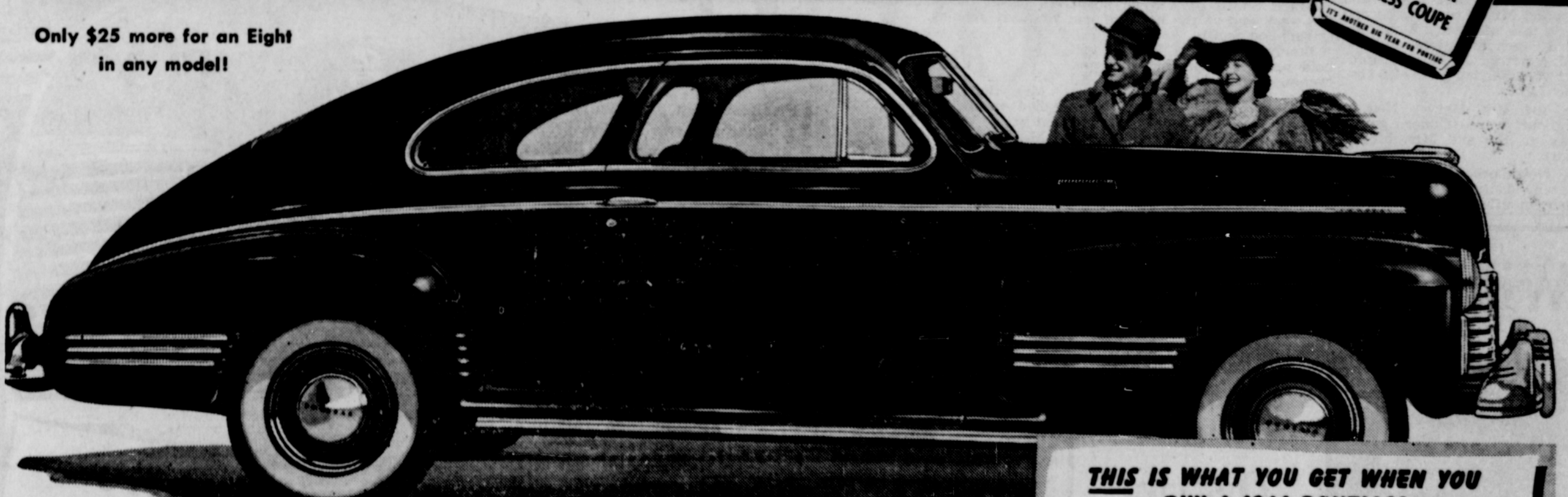
