Mrs. Hulsebus Display Novel American Flag At Row River Inn, 29

Mr. and Mrs. Alberta Hulsebus arrived from Cortaro, Arizona, Monday and will locate here. They are former residents of the Grove and are well known here. Mrs. Hulsebus is known as the second Betsy Ross, at least that is what California dubbed her ten years ago because of the large American flag she made, containing the name of each state and the state flower and state motto, also the year and date each state joined the union. The data on each state is hand painted in colors. States are in rotation, reading from left to right cross the field of blue. Delaware is the first state and Arizona the 48th.

Mrs. Hulsebus also wrote a poem, "Favorites of America," using the names of states in rotation, the state flower and motto. The poem was published in 1931 under a copyright. The name of the poem was painted on white velvet and made a large banner of it. She also made a quilt, a true map of the U. S., each state being drawn to scale.

These works of art have all been exhibited at fairs, bazaars, clubs, etc., and the flag has been exhibited at grade and high school. Mrs. Hulsebus also gives a talk about the first flag to the pupils.

This flag will be exhibited at the Row River Inn on Tuesday, October 29th, all day. The public is cordially invited to view the exhibit and meet Mrs. Hulsebus. There are no charges for viewing it.
